PROCEEDINGS OF ALDERMEN.

At November Meeting. Liquor Licenses Applied For. New City Ord. 1903.

New Bern, N. C., Nov. 8, 1903.

Board met in regular monthly session, Mayor Ellis presiding. Aldermen present, Smith, Avery, Lane, McSorley, Phillips, Wood, McArthur, Watson, Gulton and Hollowell.

Minutes of previous meeting read and adopted.

Application was made to the Board by several for City license to retail liquors six months from December 1st 1903, to June 1st, 1904. Upon motion license was granted to following named persons. All Aldermen present voting for, except Alderman Hollowell, who voted no on every application. Alderman Wood, upon request was excused from voting.

Application of T. O. Howard for license to retail liquors six months to June 1st 1904 was refused.

Resolution signed by several, asking for a drinking hydrant on Pasteur street, and a fire alarm box on corner of Pasteur and Queen Sts., was read to Board, upon motion the matter was referred to Street and Pump Committee.

Chairman Cemetery Committee reported the Oak pond in Cedar Grove Cemetery in a leaking condition, and the cost to repair would be about \$45.00. The Committee was instructed to have the work done.

Upon motion the Street and Pump Committee was instructed to purchase a shell soap sufficient to place on street of some block from corner to corner as an experiment.

The condition of old fire horse Jim was discussed and decided best for him to be used on street to haul trash only.

Resolution offered by Alderman Gulton that the barrooms shall be closed between the hours of 10 o'clock p. m. and 6 a. m.

The Resolution was very elaborately discussed after which Alderman Gulton moved the whole matter be laid on table so ordered.

Upon motion the Street and Pump Committee was instructed to employ some competent machinist to examine the Road Roller ordered by the City and see if the machine is as described in specification and report.

Upon motion the Street and Pump Committee was instructed to have a drinking hydrant located between George and Bern Sts.

The following resolution was offered by Alderman Watson:

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed by the Mayor to inquire into the advisability and cost of widening Lorchs alley.

That the committee report the cost and get offers from owners of property to be used for the street.

That the said committee also see what contributions should and will be made by adjacent property towards the expense.

The Mayor appointed Watson, Wood and Bengert committee.

The following resolution was passed.

Resolved, That the list as prepared by W. S. Frazier and filed as adopted as valuation of the property when listed for taxation as heretofore listed.

That the Mayor and clerk for the city endorse therein the proper and usual order for collection of the same being levied and delivred the same to the tax collector who will proceed to collect the same as provided by law.

That the Finance Committee with the aid of the city attorney be requested to inquire into the correction of the taxes reported from the corporation commission, and take such steps as may be advisable in the matter.

The following resolution was adopted.

Whereas, On account of the deplorable condition of the sidewalks and the neglected condition of the wires thereon. The same having not been used for many weeks, and the same having been allowed to become dangerous as reported to me by the Water and Light commission.

Resolved, That the poles and wires thereon of the New Bern Electric Light and Power Co. now upon the streets of the city of New Bern are dangerous to life and safety of citizens and property.

Resolved, That the same the said poles and wires be removed and abandoned and that the Mayor be directed with the assistance of the water department to have the same removed from the streets.

That the Mayor be authorized to employ such workmen as may be required, giving if he finds it advisable the same done, so to enable the Water and Light commission.

That the said material be stored in amount of the cost of the work to be done and that this work be done as soon as possible.

The following resolution was adopted.

Resolved, That the Mayor and Clerk be authorized to employ such workmen as may be required, giving if he finds it advisable the same done, so to enable the Water and Light commission.

any telegraph, electric light or telephone pole at any point upon any of the streets of this city more than twelve (12) inches beyond or outside of the curb line separating the sidewalks from the driveway of said streets.

And that any and all poles now owned or maintained standing more than twelve (12) inches beyond said curb line, shall be removed and made to conform to the provisions of this ordinance within the period of thirty (30) days from the passage hereof.

Any person, firm or corporation violating this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined fifty (\$50.00) dollars, and each additional day after the expiration of said thirty (30) days during which said poles are allowed to remain outside of the limits above provided shall constitute a separate offense.

Be it further ordained, that after the expiration of thirty (30) days from the passage of this ordinance, that all poles standing in violation of the provisions hereof may be removed under the direction and control of the Mayor, and the actual cost and expense of such removal shall be charged to and collected from the owner or owners of such poles, and the Mayor, in the name of said city is authorized and empowered to sue for and collect the same.

Be it further ordained, that a copy of this ordinance be served upon the Agent of the Western Union Telegraph Company, The Henderson Telephone Company and The New Bern Electric Light and Street Railway Company and R. F. Williams and the Water and Light Commission, and published for five (5) days in the New Bern Daily Journal.

Trick Automobiles.

Although trick automobiles can be found in France and England, the country claims the lead. The accomplishment is peculiarly well adapted to American genius. Another reason for the supremacy of Americans is the greater lightness of the American machines, taken as a class, and their extreme sensitiveness and delicacy of control. It is of course possible to do more with a light car than with a heavy French one. Another condition leading to the development of trick cars in America is the encouragement given them by the manufacturers, who favor trials of skill because they serve to exhibit machines and demonstrate to possible purchasers the lightness and facility with which automobiles may be controlled.

There are several tricks which may be classed as favorites among chauffeurs. They are all extremely difficult, but the one which more nearly borders on the marvelous is the watch trick. Only the most expert chauffeurs attempt it, as the cost of failure is the cost of a watch. To drive an automobile against an open watch, to back it and expect to stop, the heavy machine set in line to spare the watch, seems impossible, but the feat has often been performed.
