COTTON GIN BURNED.

Two Buildings Owned by Mr J M Spencer Destroyed.

A cotton gin and another building belonging to Mr J M Spencer and located near the western city limits were destroyed by fire yesterday morning. The cause of the fire is unknown.

It was discovered about 8 o'clock and had gained considerable headway. The fire department rendered assistance but was powerless to save anything on account of the progress made by the flames.

There were twelve bales of cotton in the building, two of which were saved from entire destruction. Seven bales belonged to Mr Spencer and the balance to other parties. The bales which were saved were brought down to the market.

In addition to the destruction of the cotton, there were ten tons of cotton seed and a quantity of guano burned. A steel windmill was ruined by the heat. The smaller building contained seed peas and oats, they were all consumed.

The loss is estimated at \$3000. There was no insurance.

Christian Science in Ohio.

Columbus, O., Nov. 17.—The Supreme Court today rendered a decision which is taken to mean that Christian Science may be practiced in Ohio. Some time ago a family by the name of Bishop, in Hamilton, O., was tried and acquitted on a charge of manslaughter for having permitted a child to die without giving medical aid. The State carried the case upon exceptions, and today the Supreme Court overruled the exceptions.

Foot Ball Yesterday.

On Cambridge Field yesterday, Yale defeated Harvard by a score of 16 to 0. At Norfolk, the University of Virginia and Carlele Indians played a tie game 6 to 6.

Bankruptcy Proceedings.

A petition of involuntary bankruptcy was filed in the district court here Friday evening by Morris Vogel & Bro., et al against J E Benton of this city. The petition is made returnable Dec. 4 at 10 o'clock, noon.
Mr R A Nunn represents the claimants interested. The parties live in Baltimore. Mr D L Ward is Mr Benton's attorney.
