### COMMISSIONERS PROCEEDINGS

Meeting of Board in January. Reports of County Officials.

The Board met in regular session at the court house, Monday Jan. 4, 1904 at 10 o'clock a.m.

Present Commissioners, Baxter, Richardson, Wadsworth and Harvey.

Ordered by the Board that the salary listed by Judge, H. R. Bryan be stricken from the list as the Supreme Court has decided that the salary of the Judge is not liable for taxation.

Ordered that Jane Williams be allowed to list her taxes through her agent Joshua King, she not having been in the county during the month of June.

Ordered that property of Mrs. A. B. Fowell on Middle street be reduced to \$2800 and property on Graves street to \$900 on account of over valuation.

Ordered that property of Mrs. Francis Hay on Eden street be reduced to \$1200 on account of over valuation.

Ordered that property of Nancy Bryan on Spring street be reduced to \$200 on account of over valuation.

Ordered that property of Mrs. Anita Manly on George street be reduced to \$1700 on account of over valuation.

Ordered that the property of Marshall Smith in 8th township be reduced to \$800 on account of over valuation.

Ordered by the Board that the lots of land in Farmville, Nos. 293 and 303, formerly listed by J. E. O'Hara, agent for Jas. S. Alston as one lot, be corrected so that the same may be listed as two lots.

Ordered by the Board that W. O. Brewer and other citizens of No. 1 township having filed a petition before the Board asking that a public landing be laid off at Cowpen on Neuse river four miles above three-eighths of the purpose of receiving and delivering freight, that no ice of said petition be published according to law for 30 days and that Mr. M. Morris and all others claiming an interest in said matter be notified to appear before the Board of Commissioners at their next meeting on the 1st Monday in February 1904 and show cause why the said petition should not be granted.

Mr. B. S. Lancaster, keeper of Neuse river bridge having resigned his said position, the Board of Commissioners declared said office vacant. Thereupon the Board proceeded to an election to fill the vacancy for the unexpired term caused by Mr. Lancaster's resignation.

The following made application for said position, viz: Wm. Lovian, Ohas Lee, I. R. Whitford, George Winfield, J. L. Wetherington, S. J. Williams, R. O. Wayne, W. O. Long, John I. Smith, Ed. Clair Lancaster, and J. L. Hall.

After several ballots Mr. I. R. Whitford received a majority of votes and was declared elected to said position.

Ordered that the property listed by Mrs. Delia Phillips in No. 1 township, known as 'Coward's Island' be reduced to \$800 on account of over valuation.

On motion Board took recess until 3:30 o'clock p.m.

Board met at 3:30 o'clock p.m. pursuant to recess.

Present Commissioners, Baxter, Richardson, Harvey and Wadsworth.

Ordered by the Board that the poll tax listed to W. J. H. Cavanaugh be stricken from the list as it appears that he is over the age of 30 years.

Mr. I. R. Whitford presented his official bond as bridge keeper of the Neuse river bridge which upon motion was accepted and ordered filed.

Ordered by the Board that license be granted to T. O. Howard to retail liquor at—Middle street for six months ending June 30th 1904 upon payment of proper tax to the Sheriff and all other taxes due the county by him. Commissioners Harvey and Wadsworth voting aye and Richardson no.

Ordered by the Board that the former order passed by the Board, rejecting the application of F. B. Babblet to retail liquor be and is hereby reconsidered and revoked. Commissioners Harvey and Wadsworth voting aye and Richardson no.

Ordered by the Board that property listed to Isaac Davenport at Jenkins land be reduced to \$300 on account of error.

Ordered that goods, wares and merchandise listed to T. B. Jackson of No. 1 Township be reduced to \$9000 on account of error in listing same.

On motion Board took recess until 10 o'clock a.m. Jan. 5th.

Board met at 10 o'clock a.m. January 5th, 1904, pursuant to recess.

Present Commissioners, Baxter, Foy, Wadsworth, Harvey and Richardson.
