SHORT PASSING EVENTS.

The weather today will be colder. There were sales in the local cotton market yesterday at 18 to 18 1/2 cents.

The J. E. Benton stock of man's furnishing goods has been purchased by J. G. Dunn & Co.

The July option of cotton at New York which sold at 14.45 on Tuesday, closed Wednesday at 18.50. The rest of the market fluctuated as wildly.

Charles F. Dana, the colored banker of Kinston, who recently failed for a large amount was discharged from bankruptcy yesterday by referee S. W. Smallwood.

The egg market has gone to smash and the hen is no longer the whole thing. In Norfolk the price of eggs dropped from 40 to 35 cents per dozen in a day and they will continue to decrease in price as the supply increases. In the local market the price which was formerly 38 cents has dropped to 18 cents.

Perhaps as large a quantity of fresh pork as was ever received in this city in one day was the quantity which was brought here yesterday. The markets were supplied with hog meat enough to furnish a good sized army with rations for many days. One meat dealer bought 6,000 pounds of pork, others had from 10 to 20 or 25 hogs in their stock. Pork is cheap now, selling as low as five cents a pound.

LAND OF THE SKY.

Plans of the Black Mountain Hotel Club. An Eastern Enterprise.

The well known house of Humphrey-Gibson Company of Goldsboro, is organizing an enterprise that will be of special interest to the people of this city, so many of whom have spent pleasant days at Black Mountain. In Buncombe county, 15 miles this side of Asheville. The plan upon which this company is organized has some new and attractive features. The Company or Club, will own, control and operate the property as a mountain resort hotel, probably all the year-round. The stockholders, however, will have a special rate for themselves and their immediate families, which will amount to a ten per cent discount. As the stockholders will be almost entirely people from the towns of Eastern Carolina who will be more or less known to each other, this place will become primarily a mountain health resort for the east.

Very many people of New Bern are already acquainted with Black Mountain and its delightful climate, and probably all have heard of the place. The property of the Black Mountain Hotel Club consists of 70 acres of improved land, with orchards and vineyards. The present hotel building will be enlarged and improved. The property is situated one mile from Black Mountain station, known as the Stevens place, and commands an unsurpassed view of the mountain ranges, the Craggles, the Blacks and the Blue Ridges. The hotel piazza will overlook fruit orchards of 2,000 trees, the property of the company, bordering the banks of the Swannanoa river.

It is proposed to make a specialty of amusements and recreations, such as bowling alleys, tennis courts, golf links, tallyho and an orchestra.

A portion of the property will later be divided into cottage lots, which will either be sold or divided among the stockholders. The authorized capital will be \$25,000.

CAUSES OF COLDS.

One of the Most Common of Them is Eating Too Much.

The invariable cause of colds comes from within, not without. No one takes cold when in a vigorous state of health, with pure blood coursing through the body, and there is no good reason why any one in ordinary health should have a cold. It may come from insufficient exercise, breathing of foul air, want of wholesome food, excess of food, lack of bathing, etc, but always from some violation of the plain laws of health.

There can be no more prolific cause of colds than highly seasoned foods as well as frequent eating. These give no time for the digestive organs to rest and incite an increased flow of the digestive secretions. Thus larger quantities of indigestible and absorbed than can be properly utilized, and the result is an obstruction, commonly called a "cold," which is simply an effort of the system to expel the useless material. Properly speaking, it is self poisoning, due to an incapability of the organism to regulate and compensate for the disturbance.

A deficient supply of pure air to the lungs is not only a strong predisposing cause of colds, but a prolific source of much graver conditions. Pure air and exercise are necessary to preserve the system for the assimilation of nutriment, for without them there can be no vigorous health. The oxygen of the air we breathe regulates the appetite as well as the nutriment that is built up in the system.

The safest and best way to avoid colds is to sleep in a room with the windows very open and to remain out of doors every day, no matter what may be the weather, for at least two hours, preferably with some kind of exercise, if no more than walking. One should not sit down to rest while the feet are wet on the clothing damp. A person may go with the clothing wet through to the skin all day if he but keeps moving. Exercise keeps up the circulation and prevents taking cold.

The physiologic cause of colds is the prevention of the occurrence. The person who does not carry around an overabundance of alimentation in his system and furthermore secures a regular circulation by slight, regular exercises, does prevent himself in a positive condition, is immune to colds. A starting cold cannot take root.

A student that would exclude the use of all narcotics and all food that is not thoroughly assimilated. An unusual person is worse off than one who is moderate. However, the correct daily diet and moderate exercise is all that is needed to insure a regular circulation by slight, regular exercises, does prevent himself in a positive condition, is immune to colds.

This is politics with a vengeance. It has often been said that doctors are poor financiers, but we believe that it cannot be truthfully said that they are poor politicians. They are wide awake when it comes to securing places at the public crib.—Medical Talk.
