### THE NEWS IN A NUTSHELL.

Marcus A. Hanna has been re-elected United States Senator from Ohio, for the term of six years beginning March 4th, 1905.

The United States Senate has passed the House bill appropriating \$500,000 for fighting the cotton boll weevil.

Ex-Governor D. L. Russell, has moved from Washington, D. C., to Johns Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore. He has kidney trouble and is seriously ill.

The fire at Dunn N. C. Wednesday destroyed the fine plant of the South Dunn Manufacturing Company, one of the largest furniture factories in the State, loss about \$75,000.

The five story Beville Building at Greensboro, N. C., was partially destroyed on Wednesday, loss \$25,000.

It is reported that William Jennings Bryan will visit North Carolina in the course of a few weeks. He does not know what points he will visit but he intends to give a series of lectures on his tour in different States, North Carolina among others.

President Roosevelt expresses his high respect for General Gordon and his grief at the announcement of his death.

St. Louis has been selected as the convention city by the Democratic National committee, the convention will be July 6th.

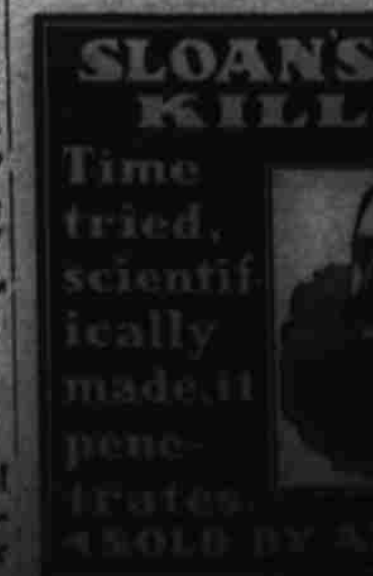
