### SCHOONER ASHORE

On Outer Diamond Shoals Sunday Morning. Total Loss.

Beaufort, N. C., Jan. 15.—The schooner Joseph W Brooks, 8040 tons Capt Lewis A Davidson, from Savannah, January 14th to Baltimore with 900,000 feet of lumber, went ashore on Outer Diamond Shoal Sunday morning at 8 o'clock. The weather was heavy, stormy and in darkness light could not be seen. The schooner went ashore 24 miles from here and is a total loss. The crew of seven including officers were rescued by Cape Lookout Life Saving Station men. Men saved only clothes they wore. The schooner went to pieces in one hour and half after striking.

Capt Davidson of the wrecked schooner expresses heartfelt thanks in behalf of himself and crew for the prompt service of the Life Saving men and their kindness and welfare for them. The wrecked sailors are well and being nursed.

### THE NEWS IN A NUTSHELL.

Bishop C B Galloway, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, called at Methodist missionaries in Corea to see photo S. out immediately or go to Japan.

Senator Hanna issued the call for the Republican national convention to meet at Chicago at noon June 21st, 1904 to select candidates for President and Vice President.

The president of the Normandy Spinners' syndicate has called to the Lanca shire federation the 87 per cent of the spindle in Normandy are stopping a day per week, and adding to this will be continued until the end of March.

The Kentucky house committee on suffrage and election has decided to report favorably the Helms suffrage bill. This measure in effect disfranchises the negro on the ground of illiteracy.

Six additional churches were closed in Chicago by order of the City Building Commissioner Williams. At the same time, a dozen halls were ordered closed. An inspection is being made of all the hospitals throughout the city.

Because the sugar crop is about to be marketed New York importers are urging the State Department to recognize some one of the contending parties in Santo Domingo.

A Detroit firm owning coal mines in Virginia has received a rush order for 40,000 tons of Pocahontas coal for the Japanese government.

Advocates of rural free delivery say they will oppose the new postal order affecting the delivery of newspapers by rival carriers.
