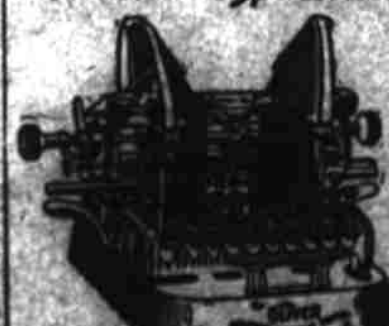

The Coffin Plant at Burlington, N. C., was destroyed by fire last Tuesday. The loss is estimated about \$20,000 with \$11,000 insurance.

The fifteenth annual convention of United Mine Workers of America is in session at Indianapolis. President Mitchell is presiding.
