FIRE AT LOUISBURG.

Brick and Wood Store Buildings, and Dwellings Destroyed. Loss \$45,000.

Raleigh, Jan 24.—Louisburg, suffered from a fire early this morning. Telephone messages came to the Chief of the fire department here, at four o'clock, asking for help, and the old steam engine, the "Hooper" was taken to the train to be carried to Louisburg, but at that moment a second message told the fire was under control. The fire began at the river and extended along a street to the river house. The latter building was on fire but the flames were extinguished, having done but trifling damage. It was feared that if the river house was burned large tobacco warehouses and prize houses near by would be destroyed. The fire burned four brick stores, two wooden ones, three dwellings, and four or five other buildings in which there were offices, barber shops, etc. It is said that the loss is something like \$50,000.

What jury could convict a man who could, entrench himself behind such an array of righteous reasoning? With this array of evidence not to be established by the defendant, but to the disproved by the prosecution that has had a previous good name, any family influence or any money to employ counsel to apply this extreme doctrine of intent can never be convicted of crime?
