Question Between State and Government Regarding Convict

Light Snow, Bogus Firm Operated Extensively, Personal Argument on Commutation Life Sentence, Tax Case For St. Louis Rabbini

Raleigh, Jan. 29.—The snow ended at 11 o'clock last night. For the first time in several years there is a crust of snow, which makes it rather a rough time for the partridges, although forunately the snow is not very deep here, about four inches.

It was stated today by an official of the bogus firm of "Voces & Pows," which has been operating here, that a operating party extensively at Louisville.

Private Secretary F. M. Pearsall and Major W. Hopton Smith of Goldsboro, who have been at St. Augustine Fla., attending the General Convention of the National Guard Association of the United States have gone to Nassau in the West Indies, to enjoy some summer weather.

Governor Aycock will on Monday hear argument on the petition for the commutation to life imprisonment of John B. Register, murderer, who is in jail at Whiteville, under sentence to be hanged February 26th. Register's counsel, John D. Bellamy and Claude Bernard will be here on his behalf.

Some very fine furniture is on its way here from High Point, sent by the furniture factories there, to be exhibited at the exposition at St. Louis, and will be part of the State's exhibit. Commissioner Ramsey says it is the purpose to get all the exhibits from this State shipped within the next thirty days and that they will all be sent as near together as possible. They will fill about ten cars.

BRITISH COTTON-GROWERS' PLAN.

Gambling in Futures Discussed by Master Spinners at Manchester.

London, Jan. 29.—The Duke of Marlborough, Under Secretary for the Colonies, received a delegation of the British Cotton Growers' Association at the Colonial Office today. The delegation was much encouraged by the government's attitude. The Duke expressed the sympathy of the government with the movement to secure an adequate supply of British-grown cotton. Large areas will immediately be planted in West Africa. The association is satisfied that the work done is past the experimental stage.

Detailed plans to restrict gambling in cotton were discussed at a meeting of the Master Cotton Spinners at Manchester today. The principal proposition was to discontinue to buy futures, etc., to increase the purchases of G. I. Y (good) insurance and freight, and to carry larger stocks as a protection against market fluctuations. An alternative plan was to purchase for a stipulated monthly delivery. The subject was finally referred to a special committee.

It was reported to the meeting that the short time movement was progressing satisfactorily.


NUSSLI'S CONCRETE WITHOUT AVELL.

London, Jan. 29.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Times says that nothing is known to competent quarters regarding Nussli's reported intention to enter the question of a tunnel through the Straits of Gibraltar. It is reported that with the tunnel in the hands of Nussli, the Straits might be well be cut north and the Mediterranean railway and its branches.

Several observers here that Japan's intervention will result in the withdrawal of the British troops from the Straits of Gibraltar.
