SONS OF OLD NORTH STATE HEROES ON MANY A FIELD.

The magnificent record for heroism made by the Sons of the Old North State upon many battlefields was the theme of a highly interesting speech of Hon. Chas. R. Thomas, of North Carolina, which has just appeared in the Record. The failure of northern historians to give to the revolutionary struggle in the south the prominence they deserve adds to the interest which every southerner must feel in each contribution to the history of that period which does justice to the heroes too often forgotten; and it is that feeling which impels me to give greater prominence to the speech of Mr. Thomas than is usually given to such speeches in the house or senate dealing with apparently local subjects.

One of the general appropriation bills was under consideration in the house when Mr. Thomas, taking advantage of the latitude allowed in debates upon such measures, called attention to a bill he has introduced appropriating \$10,000 to inclose and beautify the grounds and repair the monument on the Moore's Creek battle field of North Carolina. In presenting this measure for urging that appropriation, Mr. Thomas said:

"While we are making these large appropriations for the salaries of government officials and the expenses of our government, it seems to me that it would be well for us not to forget the memory of great men and great events in our country's history, and that some small share at least of the large appropriations made by our government annually should be given and used for the purpose of commemorating the distinguished patriots, soldiers and statesmen of our country, and great battles and historical events.

"The lives of noble patriots and the memory of decisive battles and events are incentives to higher aspirations in our individual and national life. Putnam says it was a custom of the Romans to erect monuments to the most celebrated and distinguished of Romans, and to carve upon such monuments the record of the illustrious achievements of him in whose honor a monument was erected. These monuments were set upon a hill and the Roman youth were bidden by their parents to study the lives of their distinguished ancestors as they saw them carved in enduring marble, and they were told that they, too, would have a life monument erected to them and the record of their life work carved upon it if they emulated the virtues and practiced the examples of those who had gone before.

"All the nations of the world, I think, commemorate by statues and monuments those events in their history which have led to independence or marked epochs in their national life, and the United States of America, the greatest nation upon earth, in resources, in wealth, in population, and in everything which goes to make great and free people, should not neglect to honor the great men and great events in history, because, forsooth, it may add some little to the sum total of the appropriations of the government. We are expending millions of dollars for other purposes, some of them not half so meritorious as the erection of monuments and the marking and preservation of battle grounds.

"North Carolina has always been a modest state. Her motto is, 'Esse quam videri.' To be, rather than to seem. Nevertheless, within the borders of this great state which I have the honor to represent in part in congress, have been reared some of the nation's most distinguished men, and there have occupied some of the greatest events in our country's history. I shall enter upon no eulogium upon North Carolina. In the language of the immortal Webster speaking of his state, Massachusetts, 'she needs none.' The history of my state, while not so well known as the history of New England, is inseparable from the early settlement of our country and the history of the war of the revolution.

"It is needless for me to recall to your minds that the first settlement of the State—Bates upon the shores of the western continent was in North Carolina, upon Roanoke Island, in the year 1585, under Sir Walter Raleigh, after whom the capital of our state is named, and there, under the first Charles, began in the United States. Although long in the list of the colonies to enter the confederation, not being so until the first year of the revolution, known as the 'Year of '76,' it has been adopted, North Carolina was one of the foremost and bravest of the colonies in the revolutionary struggle, and furnished more than her quota of fighting men and soldiers to the cause. Not only in that war but in all subsequent wars in which this country has been involved, during the revolution, North Carolina was prominently named by British invaders who, however, were opposed with great courage and valor by our brave patriots. The battle of Alamogordo, Ocracoke, and the battle of Hatteras, were the result of the fighting of our brave men in the revolution.

"During the Revolution, the first battle of the State, known as the battle of the Clouds, was fought in the year 1776, and it was the result of the fighting of our brave men in the revolution.

Yesterday Messrs Barras and Gray, local managers for A. B. Baxter & Co., received the following telegram: 'A. B. Baxter & Co., Inc have assigned. All trades to be closed at closing today.'

A. B. Baxter & Co., are large operators and have 100 sub-offices located in different parts of the country. Baxter is said to hold two seats in the cotton exchange and is also represented in the stock exchange and Board of Trade.

IMPORTANT RELIGIOUS CONGRESS
