RALEIGH
Governor Grants Requisition For Mardian Hospital For Leprosy. Old Vietnam.

Raleigh, March 10.—The directors of the hospital for the insane have adjourned today. They confirmed the action of superintendent McKee in securing the transfer of 16 female patients from this district to the Western hospital. Superintendent Murphy of the latter hospital has promised to take nine more, but it is hoped to secure the entrance of even more than this number. There is some room here for male patients and superintendent McKee intends to make an exchange by taking some men from the Western hospital and sending women there. It is hoped in this way to make room for a total of 25 female patients from this district who earnestly need attention.

Mention has been made of the fact that Governor Aycock has received requisition from the Governor of South Carolina for Thomas and Edward Wakefield, white men, brothers, who are wanted for murder at Spartanburg, both being in jail at Wayneville. The Governor promptly honored the requisition and issued his warrant of rendition. Then the man instituted habeas corpus proceedings before Judge Ferguson returnable today. A telegram to the Governor says the man were guilty of a horrible murder and that the habeas corpus proceedings were for the purpose of gaining time. Their lawyers endeavored to get the Governor to withdraw his warrant, and renewed that attempt, but the Governor said the whole matter was in the judge's hands.

One of the oldest inmates of the Soldiers Home here is very feeble and not likely to live more than a few days. He is Allison Black, well known in the Piedmont section. The oldest man in the home is 88 years of age. He was seen at the State Museum today. Among the inmates are two Frenchmen who served during the entire war.

The State Superintendent of public instruction issued warrants today for five new libraries for rural public schools and for five supplementary libraries. He was pleased to receive letters from the superintendents of New Hanover and Durham stating that nearly every school district in those counties now has a library. These libraries are well conducted and very popular.
