### BOTH SIDES LOST.

Severe Naval Battle at Port Arthur

Moscow Merchants Baraged at America's Friendliness for Japan. They Threaten to Sever Commercial Relations.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 11.—The Russian torpedo fleet left Port Arthur this morning and attacked the Japanese fleet. The engagement is reported to have been very severe resulting in the loss of one Japanese torpedo boat and one Russian torpedo boat destroyer, the Baposhichin. Both crews were lost.

London, Feb. 11.—A dispatch received this evening from Moscow says the merchants there and in St. Petersburg have decided to sever all commercial relations with American firms owing to the anti-Russian sentiment that exists in the United States.

Washington, Feb. 11, Rear Admiral Evans wired today that commander Sawyer of the gunboat Helena, stationed at Newchwang has protested against Russian sinking boats in Yinkow harbor. Secretaries Hay and Moody have decided to uphold the protest as Newchwang is a neutral port in Manchuria.

London, March 11.—There is much rejoicing at St. Petersburg over the offensive moves made by Admiral Makarov. As soon as he appeared, he ordered the removal of the battleship Retzhan, which is stranded at the mouth of the harbor, barring the channel, making egress of battleships impossible. This morning he directed a sortie of torpedo boat flotilla supported by a part of the Russian squadron upon the Japanese fleet. The result is not known.

Tokio, March 11.—It has been ascertained here that the reason why the Russians did not reply to the Japanese bombardment at Vladivostok March 6th, was that there was a lack of ammunition.

London, March 11.—The Nagasaki correspondent of the Daily Express asserts that 200,000 troops have been sent from Japan and that a portion of the second army is now on its way to Korea.

### Farmers Hold Wheat

Washington, Feb. 11.—The March report of the Bureau of Statistics of the Department of Agriculture shows that the amount of wheat still remaining in the hands of farmers is 129,000,000 bushels, or about 90 per cent of the entire crop of 1903. The corn still unsold amounts to about 600,000,000 or 75 per cent of the crop of 1903.
