MOORE'S ACCOUNTS.

Of His Receivables at A & N C Railroad. Does Not Return to Rev. Born for Settlement.

Raleigh, March 19.—V E Moore, receiver of the Atlantic and North Carolina railway did not go to New Bern yesterday, though at ten o'clock Thursday night he said he was going there yesterday morning. He was at the office of the clerk of the United States District Court here yesterday, looking into the matter of stating his account. It is now said that he will not go to New Bern, but that the treasurer of the road will make a statement for him, which he will sign and file with the clerk of the court here, in order that Judge Purnell may examine it and pass upon it. It is approved that Moore will be relieved of his \$50,000 bond.

This report covers the time from February 26th to March 17th, both days inclusive, and shows cash on hand February 26th, \$3,048, receipts to March 15th, \$25,127, disbursements \$16,408, cash on hand \$12,767.

To this statement through its attorneys, Busbee and Busbee, the State does not accept. The report was made out by Treasurer Manly who came here.

T D Moore and Thomas B Cooper, are allowed \$48 and \$38 respectively as accountants. The State excepts to the bill presented by Moore for \$100, for premium to be paid the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Co., for his bond as receiver, but the Judge allows this \$100 as an item of expense in executing the order of court, the unexpired premiums on such bond to be paid to A and N C Railway.

Treasurer Manly is bonded for forty thousand dollars, Sept. 1st for five thousand, and agents and conductors for total of \$23,000 in same company.

This afternoon Moore presented to Judge Purnell his account as Receiver, covering the period while he held that position. The Judge approved the accounts, discharged him as Receiver and released him from liability.

Sully Expects to Resume.

New York, Feb. 19.—J H Carleton and Co, announced their failure on the Cotton Exchange this morning. A letter from Sully was read, announcing that all margins deposited with trust companies would be released, freeing millions of dollars, and that he expected to resume business.

NEW HELLO WORKS.

The Home Telegraph and Telephone Company is to begin extensive reconstruction this week.

Next Tuesday active work will begin on the construction of the new telephone exchange.

The Home Telegraph and Telephone Co., who for some time have contemplated this enlargement are now in shape to carry out their plan. They make no bluff in this matter but stand ready to make good.

There are now in the possession of Mr. L. S Grant 27,000 feet of wire, part of which is insulated for wiring houses, the balance metallic wire for the local exchange. There have also arrived several car loads of jumper poles which number 118 and will average 39 feet in height. Cross bars, pins and other articles necessary to the building of the exchange have been received or are on the way.

The expense which will be made in this improvement will be \$15,000 and it will take them three months to complete it.

Naval Reserve Blazieira.

Blazieira, March 18. The Beaufort Naval Reserve have organized among themselves a substantial troupe, and have been practicing for some time. They have some fine contraltos and the latest talent from New York.

In a few days they will play at Beaufort.

FEAR COMPLICATIONS

Over China's Refusal to Comply With Russian Demand to Withdraw Troops. Bands Attack Under Shadow of Port Arthur. Makaroff Held by Japanese.

St Petersburg, March 19.—The Oser's naval experts think that the Japanese Fort Arthur fleet after the late bombardment, are now coaling and provisioning at some Chinese port.

Changhai, March 18.—The fleet under Admiral Makaroff made an attempt to dash out of the harbor to join the Vladivostok fleet, but were driven back with out a shot by the Japanese fleet blockading the harbor. It is believed that Admiral Togo is preparing for a final blow against Port Arthur.

London, March 19.—The attitude of China in refusing to comply with Russia's demand to withdraw the troops now beyond the great wall is believed in government circles to threaten serious complications. It is believed if Russia should attempt to carry out her threat, troops will be sent to seize Peking and a general uprising in China would result, precipitating the interference of other powers for the protection of their interests. The situation is considered quite alarming.

Yinkow, Feb. 19.—Five hundred Chinese bandits attacked Chikow a suburb of Port Arthur and killed thirty Russians, and wounded many others. Russians claim that bandits were hired by Japan. It is stated that Japanese do not consider Fort Arthur safe from attack and will not put stores and munitions there at risk taking the town.
