### Call For State Convention.

The following call for the State convention has been issued from the headquarters of the Democratic State Committee: At a meeting of the Democratic State executive and central committee in Raleigh, March 18th, the State convention of the party was called to meet at Greensboro, Thursday June 16th, at noon to nominate candidates for governor and other State officers, two associate justices of the Supreme court, and two presidential electors at large and to elect four delegates and four alternates at large to the national convention of the party in St. Louis, July 8th. The convention of delegates to the State convention from each congressional district is hereby called to meet in Greensboro at eleven o'clock, June 22nd, to elect a vice president of the convention, one member of the committee on credentials, rules and order of business, permanent organization, and platform and resolutions, four members of the Democratic State committee, and two delegates to the national convention. All Democrats are cordially invited to attend the precinct conventions to be called by the various county committees and participate in electing delegates to the county conventions. ### SUMMER VACATIONS.

There will be something doing at The Black Mountain Inn.

Black Mountain, April 15.—The club which owns the "Inn" at Black Mountain N. C. expects to have one of the best summer resorts to spend the heat of summer months that can be found in the State, for themselves and their friends. Some notes of the place may be of interest.

The main club building of twenty rooms is being enlarged by a dining hall 28 by 40 feet which is now well under way. This will be a very inviting place the northern side of the room will be largely made of windows, looking out on the mountain ranges. A large stone fireplace at the end of the room will hold blazing logs on cool days, and the piazzas will add to the 400 feet already surrounding the main building.

The "annex" building will contain a considerable number of bedrooms, to add to the accommodations, and in this building will be the amusement hall, 40 by 40 feet, with an excellent dancing floor, pool table, etc. This building is 40 by 80 feet.

The grounds are also being put in shape, with roads, walks and bridges and all of the fifty acres will be beautiful.

The gardener is now putting in his vegetable plots and it is also expected that the Inn will be supplied with fresh milk from its own dairy, which will be a guarantee of its purity.
