And all mankind will say behold how is that man Carnegie? Come, let worship at his shrine."

But the great public cried, "cut it out thou Booteh hypocrite; Thy money is ill spent when thou erectest thine own grand monument. Bewake thyself to the dark Abodes of oblivion and there rot in ignominious obscurity."

Death of Worthy Colored Man.
 Cyprian Spices, an aged and worthy old colored man died at his home, on Bricos Creek, about five miles from New Bern, yesterday morning at six o'clock. "Uncle Slip," as he was familiarly known, was born a slave in Ouslow county in the latter part of the Eighteenth Century, and had passed his hundredth birthday several years ago.

In his early manhood he was bought by David Sanders, later one of the most extensive and wealthy planters of Onslow, and was a faithful and trusted servant of that gentleman until the close of the war which gave him freedom, after which though advanced in age he drifted to this county.

The writer knew "Uncle Slip" upwards of thirty years ago, and at that time he was considered a very old man, but was fairly active, and until about ten years ago was able to do much towards earning his support. Since then his sight began to fail until he became completely blind, and for several months before his summons the old man has been helpless.

The old dorky led an industrious life, he was honest and truthful, and was respected by all who knew him. Peace to his ashes.
