AN EXCITING ADVENTURE.

A Young Man Nearly Drowned While Swimming.

Sunday afternoon a party of 20 or 30 young men engaged one of the Naval Reserve boats for a little cruise down the river. When at a point four or five miles from the city two of the boys Ernest Burch, salesman for Estelita Bros and Nelson Angell took a notion to go in swimming. After they went in the water the boat left them by considerable distance and the boys started out for a post situated about 100 feet away. It was found that the post was not placed strongly enough to hold them so Burch changed his course and endeavored to get to another post about 150 yards distant.

Young Burch, although a very good swimmer had the wind and tide against him and before he could get to the post where he could stop and rest he began to feel his muscles cramp. He called for help, Nelson heard the cries and took in the situation at once. He realized that if he should attempt to help the struggling boy that the chances were that they would both be drowned. He hollered to Ernest to turn on his back and keep swimming. This the boy did but his entire right side was rendered helpless. Burch went down twice before he reached the post and although on the point of drowning he pluckily kept swimming. Argell had finally reached Burch. The latter caught hold of Angell's foot and in that manner was enabled to keep his head above the water. It was said that the impression of Burch's fingers were visible on Angell's foot for many hours so desperate was Burch.

The boys in the boat hearing the cry of distress hastened back to where the swimmers were but had considerable difficulty to get to the scene on account of the wind and tide. Burch had gone under for the third time just before the boat reached them and was in a semi-conscious state. He was helped into the boat and the boys worked over him for an hour before he was considered out of danger. It was the closest call to death the young man has ever had, and it is as close as any one would care to be.

Much credit is due to Nelson Angell for his presence of mind in rendering assistance. Although his hesitating action may have seemed strange, it was the wisest thing to do.

Police Court Melange

The Mayor's tribunal Monday was one of interest. There were no cases of great importance yet in themselves they developed considerable amusement for those present in the court room.

Spurling Thomas and Richard Bryna, plead guilty to hitching their horses to trees. They were let off with costs.

James Westphal, was arrested Sunday on two counts, allowing men to be in his place of business on Sunday and selling liquor on Sunday. Policemen Lepton, Bryan and Parker, saw men hovering around his place Sunday evening who were evidently getting liquor somewhere. This was arrested in a very intoxicated condition others were more or less under the influence of liquor. The citizens were convinced that they had been enough to make a raid and at 8 o'clock went into Westphal's saloon on Queen street and made a raid consisting many bottles of liquor which were used as evidence in the trial. There was much to make one think of a "lift" a tiger.

Washington was fined ten dollars and costs for disorderly conduct and also ten dollars for allowing men to be in the saloon on Sunday.

The man, Rufus Hill was arrested on the same thing and under the same circumstances at Washington.

Henrietta Bryna, and Geneva Moore, two antagonists of a drunken color were in court on a disorderly conduct charge. They were let off upon the payment of costs.
