RALEIGH.

State Medical Society in Session; Eastern Asylum at Goldsboro Full of Patients Observation of the Venereal.

Dr McFurham.

Raleigh May 22d.—The 51st annual meeting of the North Carolina Medical Society began today in the Hall of the House of Commons in the Capitol. It was called to order by Dr. Hubert A. Royette, the chairman of the local committee. State Auditor B. F. Lixon delivered the address of welcome on behalf of the State, Ed Chambers Smith that on behalf of Raleigh, Dr. James M. Parrott, of Winston, responding. Dr. H. B. Weaver of Asheville, the president of the society, delivered the annual address. Reports were made by Dr. F. L. Syler of Franklin, Dr. M. L. Stevens of Asheville, Dr. Frank Roberts of Marshall, and Dr. G. C. Edwards of Green county. The attendance is quite a large, over 200 being present, besides 91 applicants for license as physicians.

Superintendent J. M. Miller of the hospital for the colored insane at Goldsboro says it is entirely full, there being 324 patients, more than three fifths of whom are women. During the past week eight applications have been received, six from women. Superintendent James McKee of the hospital for the insane here says there are 311 female patients, filling the 311 beds in that ward with 60 applications on file, while 29 applications have been forwarded to the Western Hospital. There are 287 male patients and 194 beds. Some men were to be brought here from the Western Hospital.

The reports to the agricultural department of this State, upon which the returns of crops, with per cent of acreage condition, etc., are based, are coming in quite rapidly. So far as received they show an increase of about 20 per cent in the acreage of cotton, which is somewhat larger than was expected, previous estimates having been from 12 to 35 per cent. It is very clear the farmers have planted cotton to the very limit. The reports as to the fruit crop make a much better showing as to per cent than was expected.

In an interview with the venerable yet sprightly Dr. J. B. Furham regarding his impression of the people in this State, he said that they were more contented and prosperous than in any time since 1860 in his opinion. He regards the negroes as the best test of the real prosperity of the country and says he has been through some of the leading counties of the "black belt" and finds that the negroes show the prosperity, are saving money, and are making investments, buying real estate and other property and improving it.
