The peach crop was not profitable in this section. The cold cut first blooms. There was an enormous yield in quantity, but not much in receipts. Quite a number of our farmers sold peas in Norfolk and Philadelphia at 25c to 30c per bushel, which did not pay picking and shipping expenses.

A & M College Commencement. Medical Society in Session. Application For A & N C Reciprocity To Be Heard Saturday.

Raleigh, May 25.—The commencement exercises at the Agricultural & Mechanical College were held today, and were very largely attended. Though there were two other college commencement in progress at the same time, those of St. Mary's School and Peace Institute while that at Wake Forest also attracted many people from here.

The speakers at the A & M College and their subjects were: R. P. Reese, "Society's Dependence on the Engineer;" J. B. Harding, "Our Textile Growth;" G. H. Hodges, "Power Transmission;" William Kerr, "Our Agricultural Opportunity;" E. P. Bailey, "Democracy and Education." There were 38 seniors, and the honor men, who made over 90 for the four years course are J. B. Harding, R. P. Reese, William Kerr, and J. C. Temple.

More members of the State Medical Society arrived today to swell the large number already in attendance. One of the features of today was the address, illustrating by Professor Baskerville of the State University on Radium. He has won much honor in connection with the discovery of two new elements and his lecture was heard with great interest.

Today the annual convention of the Kings' Daughters began at Rockingham. Mrs. W. H. S. Bargwyn of Weldon presiding, and Mrs. F. A. Olds being present as recording secretary. Mr. W. B. Streeter who is interested so deeply in the movement for the reform of children is attending the meeting.

The State Board of Agriculture was in session today at the board of trustees of the A & M College and attended the commencement exercises, at which Governor Aycock, secretary of State Grimes, Treasurer Lacy, Auditor Dixon and other State officers were present. This evening the board met and received reports from Secretary Brewer and other officials, also one from Commissioner General Herbert Brimley on the North Carolina exhibit at the St. Louis exposition.

State superintendent Joyner made an address at Kinston today at the commencement exercises of the college there. At his office news was received that Moravian Falls, in Wilkes county had voted local tax for public schools.

Though Saturday is the day set by Judge Purnell for the hearing of the application of Ouyler for a receiver for the Atlantic & North Carolina railway, it is expected that the case will go over, perhaps for a week until Judge Purnell gets through with the docket of the Federal court, the session of which begins on the 30th inst.

The State board of examiners of trained nurses has been in session here since Monday and today completed its work. Tomorrow the North Carolina Association of nurses will meet here. Six young women were applicants for license.

Mrs. Mary Irdell has been elected president of the alumnae association of St. Mary's College. Mrs. Beale S. Leak, Mrs. Gaston Morris, Mrs. Florence Tucker and Mrs. L. McK. Pittenger, vice presidents, Miss Kate McKimmon, secretary. The association will enlarge the chapel at the school during the summer.

New Rural Route.

A new rural route will be established from the New Bern post office June 1st which will include the post office of Askew and other offices adjacent. This will be known as "route no. 8."

Mr. Rufus J. Fulcher will be the carrier on this route, he having attained the highest mark of five competitor's in the examination held here May 7th.
