FORT MYERS FLA.

May 26th.—Left Punta Gorda Fla. on the 18th inst for "Sanibel Island," some 45 miles distant on board schooner, "Diplomas" Capt. L. D. Gibbons, bound to Key West, arrived at Sanibel next morning. Took a load of live stock, consisting of a family of people ten in number up the Caloosahatchie river 25 miles to Ft. Myers getting there at 8 p. m. Tuesday 17th inst. As this was our first trip to Ft. Myers we labored about much to our great delight and pleasure.

Myers is a beautiful city or large town the prettiest, and one of the oldest towns in Florida population about 2500 souls, nearly all whites, but since the railroad has tapped the place, the colored people are coming in some. Myers is on the above named river and commands a dim view of surrounding country and of course is the banner town of Lee County. Extensive groves of all kinds of tropical fruit are seen in and around the town.

One D. G. Higgins owns two orange groves in the vicinity, one 400 and the other 300 acres, Mr. F. lives in Myers and has a fine and costly residence here. We saw the coconuts, bananas, papadillo, mango, kumquat, alligator pear, besides oranges, grape fruit, lemons, limes, and several other kinds of tropical fruit in full bloom, that is, full of growing fruit. The coconuts, papadillo and bananas, we had not seen in fruit, much before. In the Taxidermist Hall we noticed, the alligator, frog, snakes, birds, fish, animals and etc. We saw a huge tarpon that was caught with hook and line weighing 200 lbs, when caught. The big pelican in two forms, the silver gray heron a beautiful, large bird.

A huge rattler and king snake, the largest jaw fish weighing as much as 500 lbs, and many other things not seen in the Northern countries, which interest one much that is a stranger to the South.

Sanibel Island, is a pretty town about 14 miles long and 2 1/2 miles wide, covered with truck farms, population some 50 people all white, 2 stores, 2 churches, 2 post offices, two large steamer wharves and warehouses, where two str's ply daily going and coming from Myers and Punta Gorda. This Island is near the inlet going out to Key West.

As we passed along going down the bay from Punta Gorda, we saw some fine hotels built on islands, one called "Utopia" on a small island another "St. James, on Pine Island at which south end is a small town or village named St. James City, these are owned entirely by northern capitalists and is opened for boarders from December to June, the board is high from \$4 to \$6 per day. Immense herds of wild game, such as deer, coon, rabbits, possums, gophers, etc., roam over these islands, and alligators, snakes, sandflies and mosquitoes abound in many places.

Myers is lighted by electric lights, and the streets are made with crushed rock or asphalt, and are beautifully laid out.

We leave Myers, tomorrow, going back to Sanibel with a load of fertilizer for Mr. G. M. Cooper, one of the largest truckers on the island. Our trip from there will be next to Key West.

Forgot to mention and incident a little odd from the agent on "Sanibel Island," there is a family of 12, husband named, Lieut. A. J. Channing, wife named Lorraine, the ten children are all girls, and the names of all the same commence with the letter L. We only think of a few, viz. Lonnie, Lelia, Lejona, Lowell, Leota, Leowilla, Lussan, Latta, etc., rest not remembered, you notice both the old folk's names commence with same letter, we suppose the old gent, was an officer in the Spanish war.

The Caloosahatchie river, is about 3 miles wide at this place, the river is navigable for steam boat work 100 miles above here. We see here, in P—G—many Tarpon, one in particular, who is County Commissioner named Mr. Lilly, who owns good property in the town.

We noticed some sweet potatoes immense size, variety called 4 to the 100 also some Key West yams, these potatoes are like the N. C. yams, but grow very large in size, weighing often 25 lbs each, hence the name 4 to the 100. Mr. Cooper tells us he has seen one that tip the scales at 50 lbs, also there is another kind of sweet potatoes here, called "Providence" they grow to weigh 15 to 18 lbs each.

Guess we will stop for the present wishing prosperity to our friends in N. C. and elsewhere Journal included.

RECOMMENDS NEW BUILDING.

For A & M College. State Veterinary Work. A & N C Case Post-poned. Glenn's Friends Confident.

Raleigh May 26th.—The State Board of Agriculture is in session and today received from the special committee the report on the new agricultural building at the Agricultural & Mechanical College. The committee recommends a three story brick building, 200 x 65 feet to accommodate the veterinary department, including zoology, the botanical and animal husbandry, soil physics, dairying, and the department and sub-departments. The location will be in front of the State fair grounds, a very well chosen one.

State veterinarian Tait Butler made his report to the board on the work of the last six months. During that time he has cleared from ticks which caused the Texas fever among cattle parts of Burke and McDowell counties. A good lot of work in the way of clearing away ticks is expected to be done in the next six months, which is to cover the north part of Wilkes and the south part of Burke and all the counties of Surry, Catawba, and Lincoln.

It was expected that Judge Thomas R. Farnell will be here tomorrow, and he may on Saturday take up the Atlantic & North Carolina railway matter, though it is thought it will be postponed.

The friends of Capt Robert B. Glenn are very positive in their statements that he is ahead of Major Stedman in the matter of instructed delegates.

JAPS CLOSING IN.

Kin Kow In Rear Port Arthur Captured Within Ten Miles of Port.

London, May 26.—The Tokio correspondent of the Central News wires that a report has reached there that the Japanese carried Kin Kow, to the rear of Port Arthur by storm today.

Chee Foo, May 27.—Word was received here today that the Japanese are now but ten miles distant from Port Arthur. The reports adds that heavy fighting has occurred near Dainy toward which the force of Japanese is marching.

Great Attendance at Medical Convention

Raleigh May 25.—The number of doctors in attendance at the State Medical Society's Meeting today ran over 400. Dr J. Howell Way, the secretary said that this attendance was a record-breaker by far the greatest in the history of the society. He added: "The new plan of organization, with the county society as the unit of organization has proved a magnificent success. 80 of the 95 counties having effected an organization and the total membership now exceeding 1,000 which is more than double at any previous time."

Wilmington, N. C., May 26.—At the annual session of the Diocesan Council of East Carolina, which was held in St. James Church, in this city, in today's session, Rev Robert Strange of Richmond, Va., was elected bishop coadjutor.

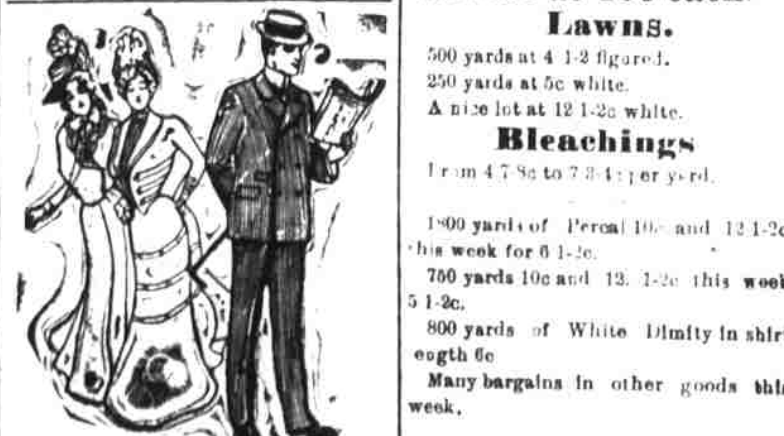
