RALEIGH.

Supreme Court Adjourns Next Week.

Board of Agriculture Finishes its Work For Session.

The Supreme Court will adjourn next week for the term. Not many opinions yet remain to be delivered. The court grants a new trial in the case of O. L. Osborne of Greensboro against M. T. Leach of Raleigh, this being a libel suit. The court finds in this case that the London libel law is constitutional, but it only provides for a relief from punitive damages upon publication of the retraction, and that actual damages can be recovered in spite of the retraction.

Today the board of agriculture finished its work for this session and adjourned. It fixed the budget of the Agricultural and Mechanical College, of which it is the board of trustees, at \$66,933. The boards this morning visited, in company with Professor of agriculture Burkett the farm at the college, of which 235 acres are in cultivation. This afternoon the board took up the matter of the new agricultural building at the college, three architects being present and two submitting plans.

In an interview with State entomologist Franklin Sherman he says that since the year began no less than 42 different species of insects have been complained of as pests by farmers, etc., most ly scale, which is reported on 28 new premises. Scale is now on fruit trees in 47 counties. Where the farmers are fighting it it is kept down. There must be a fight for all the fruit that is hereafter raised in North Carolina. A new bug has come in from Robeson county, a little larger than the tobacco flea beetle and of the same type; and will be sent to Washington for identification. As it is not known here several of the large J. J. (potato) growers are spraying their farms, using large tanks for this purpose. This year all kinds of plant lice are very abundant, especially on peach trees, more in fact than in all previous years put together. Soap and water and a kerosene emulsion will exterminate these.

Judge Purnell this morning began the hearing of the Atlantic and North Carolina railway receivership matter. He said before taking it up that he would dispose of it today.

MEARES MADE RECEIVER

Judge Purnell Gives Wilmington Man Finch's Former Job

S. G. Ryan Made Special Master to Take Evidence. Details of Trial in Raleigh Yesterday.

Raleigh, May 28th, 6 p. m.—Judge Purnell appointed Thomas D. Meares of Wilmington temporary receiver of the A & N C railway today. S. G. Ryan was made special master to take evidence.

LATER 9 p. m.

State made answer to Cuyler's complaint which was not produced in court. Judge said he had read and considered it. V. E. McEhee former receiver, came in after proceedings began. Attorney P. C. Ryan for State offered number affidavits. Ex-Judge Womack read affidavit from Mrs. Florence P. Tucker of Raleigh, largest private stockholder, also from Dempsey Wood. Private stockholder almost unanimously in favor of lease and were ready to vote for one, stating that the Governor had good proposition to lease.

The Judge asked for modification of order and continuance of case for 60 or 90 days, when the stockholders could be called together in a meeting and consider lease propositions. They deemed the best way to preserve property and enhance the interests of stockholders was by term lease and further said the issue was for lease and not receivership. Judge Purnell said there was only one question before court, advisability of appointing a receiver. He denied motion for continuance and modification. This decision put Womack's clients on the side of defense.

Petition from K. B. Finch was read asking that he be made party plaintiff, saying that proceeding before Chief Justice Clark were to obstruct this court in discharge of its duty. Judge ordered, both sides agreeing, that Finch be made a party to the suit.

The defense entered exception, Judge Purnell said he was inclined to think there was enough allegation and admission in answer to justify the appointment of receiver. This afternoon B. C. Beckwith of Board of Internal Improvement filed report with the governor, which did not concur with investigating committee in some of the conclusions.

The answer says road has been well managed for the past four years under State control as any property under control or Corporation in which State has no direction or voice that the road was never in so good condition as it is at present, is admitted by both friends and foes of management. It is concluded that governor's judgment was not at fault, in retaining Pres. Bryan that good and economical management has been sustained.

Affidavits were read from Mr. Bryan and others as to the condition of the road. The affidavits read by Judge Womack were made papers in the case.

Attorney Clark read affidavits by Mr. Bee as to the condition and management of the road arranging the management, saying that the latter gave passes for political influence. A copy of the report of the investigating committee was filed as part of Meares' affidavits. Henry Page member of the committee was sworn. He stated the committee had based its report on an observation, investigation and evidence. The original was filed with the Governor who supported the statement and was proved by carbon copy.

Attorney Ray said this evidence was wanted for use in cross examination of witnesses.

Ex-Governor Jarvis said there was no reason apparent why evidence should be kept from the public. Governor Aycock had told newspapers they were welcome to copy it if they published it all. Judge ordered the Page to file carbon copy not for use by either side but as part of record of the case.

Judge Purnell added the proceedings by appointing Thomas D. Meares receiver, until further hearing of the case.

The State appealed from this order to the U. S. Court of Appeals.

The Judge also appointed S. G. Ryan, of Raleigh, special master to take testimony to report not later than July 1st.

Receiver Meares will take charge as soon as he is qualified and given bond.

Japanese Gaining Ground

Tokyo May 28.—Admiral Togo's fleet is bombarding the fortress from the South. He has established a complete blockade around the southern end of the Liao Tung Peninsula.

This is believed to be a great step in the direction of taking Port Arthur. It is regarded by military men as remarkable feat of arms and they forecast the eventual storming of the fortification.

The loss of 12,000 Japanese soldiers is discredited.

We believe we can accomplish more in a week's time, as there will be no need at any time for a rest during work hours. It is not our intention to do less, but more work, for we are willing to work every minute of the 9 hours.

If our employers had to stand at the work bench or arise heavy lumbers 10 hours we feel sure they would agree with us.

In those cities which have nine hour systems on the contractors say that carpenters do better and more satisfactory work than they did in 10 hours. Carp at its under; many hardships from extreme heat in summer and excessive cold in winter. They have either to take their dinner with them, or rush home and eat and get back in one half hour. They toil hard to build comfortable homes for others and not one out of a hundred ever enabled to own a home.

We do not mean to wrong any one but being fully convinced that the people of New Bern will be greatly benefited, we ask that 9 hours be considered as a days work after June 6th 1904.
