Last Night's Primaries. The City Democratic primaries were held last night, to elect delegates to the county convention which meets in this city at noon, Saturday June 11th.

The various primaries were largely attended, and considerable feeling was exhibited. There was some confusion at times, but no specially hard feeling.

The greatest confusion came in voting for the various candidates, there being a separate vote on each, and in some instances there was need of another vote. This took time and there being no systematized method of counting, it was impossible to get any accurate returns last night.

Taking the various returns and expenditures as could be learned last night, it might be estimated that the election for governor was two fifths for Steadman, three fifths for Glenn.

Reports of Officers. Election of School Officers and Teachers.

At the meeting of the Trustees of New Bern Academy held yesterday, the report of the Superintendent, which was read with encouraging and gratifying approval of that of Secretary and Treasurer.

Supt. E. P. Harding was re-elected, also J. P. Spence and Miss L. L. Rowley principal and assistant principal.

All the teachers of the white school were re-elected, except Mrs. Holland and Mrs. Jenkins who declined re-election. Miss Janie Brown was elected to fill one of the vacancies, and secretary was instructed to advertise for applicants to fill the other.

Building committee reported new school building was in course of construction and would be ready for Fall session of school.

The principal and teachers of the colored school were re-elected, there being one vacancy caused by death which will be filled by the superintendent.

Big Shipment of Potatoes. The large shipment of potatoes mentioned in this column was made on the steamer Neuse last night.

One thousand barrels were sent to northern cities. Potatoes came into the city by wagon loads and boat loads and they found a ready sale at the very liberal price of \$2.25.
