CRAVEN CONVENTION

Five And One Half Hours of Business.

County Ticket Named And Commissioners Nominated. Glenn Re-elected Biggest Vote. Speeches And Resolutions Not Discussed.

The Democratic County convention of Craven, met at the Court House, Saturday June 11th. The convention was called to order by H. R. Bryan, Jr., chairman. On motion H. R. Bryan, was named for temporary chairman, Ed Gerwick and G. L. Stevens secretaries. Mr. Bryan in short speech thanked the citizens for the honor conferred upon him. He said that party harmony had never been so apparent among the Democrats of Craven county, that he was glad to say the same harmony prevailed in the National democracy, which would be wisely and patriotically, and nominate a man who would unite all Democrats who stood upon the principles of Jefferson and Jackson, and against the principles shown in the acts of the strenuous Teddy, with this feeling prevalent, democracy would stand together, harmony would prevail and victory would come.

On motion, speeches were limited to ten minutes each. On motion one delegate each protract was named for Committee on Credentials, the following named:

While waiting for credentials committee to report, there were calls for speeches. Congressman G. B. Thomas being first called, said in part: It is always a source of pleasure to be at home among the people of Craven, as well as in the presence of a democratic convention, I am obliged to the Democratic party, for it stands for principles, and against the republican party which represents robbery and plunder. Mr. Thomas as read a telegram which told of the demands made that K. G. should be the successor to the late M. S. Quay, a clear expression from the Trusts. The Congressman then spoke of the post-office funds, and the refusal of the Republicans to have public investigation made in the departments, touching also upon the arbitrary action of the judiciary. The Democratic party would present a solid front, and believed it would carry the county as well as North Carolina, and place in the White House a man calm, wise and moderate instead of the impetuous Teddy.

Mr. D. H. Ward, said the test was for the people to decide, do you favor Democrats or Republicans, and that the burden was upon the Republicans to prove a good candidate, as the Democratic party had always stood for the interests of the great mass of North Carolina, white and colored. Mr. Ward paid some deserved tributes to Congressman Thomas and G. H. Sutton Esq.

Mr. E. H. Green, said that while all the candidates would not get what they wanted, they would do right and stand by the principles of the constitution, although they had been heard expressions, that such might not be the case.

Mr. James A. Bryan, said, if there should be Democrats leaving the party through personal dissensions and going to the Republicans, we would not know it, in his speech. He then spoke of the danger which he thought that at present the colored people were provided, and that too much confidence was to be placed upon the whites in regard to their conduct. He then spoke of the State Convention to be held at the interest of their own county.
