SOME POTATO FIGURES.

A Record of one Day's Business on the Truck Market.

Transactions on the truck market yesterday were not less than any preceding day. The receipts were very up in the thousands. The supply of potatoes seem practically inexhaustible and the greatest difficulty seems to be to get sufficient barrels to pack them in and adequate means of transportation.

The truck trains yesterday morning consisted of about 60 cars. Each car contains 200 barrels, making a grand total of 12,000 barrels, or 24,000 bushels of potatoes. The figures seem fabulous but they can be verified.

The shipments by the steamer Hoboy were also very large, amounting to 2,000 barrels.

The schooner Freddy L. Hamble, brought from various points north of the Bay river section a cargo of over 700 barrels. This lot supplemented by steamer and schooner loads resulted the number to an amount that practically impossible to calculate exactly and if it were would be incredible.

Beans were also shipped in large quantities. The yield of this vegetable this year has been over 50 per cent increase. About 5000 bushels were shipped.

The ruling prices paid on vegetables yesterday were: Potatoes, first grade, \$3.20 to \$3.75 per barrel. Second grade, \$1.55 to \$1.50 per barrel. Beans 10 cents to 20 cents per bushel.

DEATH OF A RECLUSE.

George Craven, an eccentric Old Fisherman Found Dead in a Boat.

The body of George Craven, an eccentric recluse was found in a boat in Jack Smith Creek near the National cemetery yesterday. His death resulted from natural causes either apoplexy or hemorrhage. Dr Jones, the coroner was summoned but on viewing the body decided that an inquest was not necessary.

The deceased is said to have had a most interesting story connected with his life. He was very eccentric and almost morose, never mingling with other men but preferring to occupy his life with fishing. He lived alone in a boat, which he in said to have used on nearly every stream and lake in America. He was an enthusiastic and successful fisherman.

He is said to have come from Kalamazoo, Mich. Nobody knows whether he had relatives or friends as he never imparted any information about himself. He was a strange looking man. His head was covered with a thick growth of hair, red in color, but more than half turned gray. He allowed his hair to grow long and it hung in ringlets on his shoulders giving him a strange wild appearance.

He will be buried today in the Federal cemetery, the facts being known by which he is eligible to internment there. He was about 70 years old.
