There is a deplorable lack of judgment in it all, and worse, it is setting up personalities instead of principles, which are to be furthered at whatever cost it may be to the welfare of the Democratic interests of this county.

The Democratic party of this county has gone from being liberal in naming its delegates, so that even minority representation was given opportunity of expression, to the present extreme, where a minority can hardly be permitted to sit on the road side to watch the majority pass...

It is not only that the party is disorganized in its own home county, but it goes to a State convention without character or influence. It places the Democrats of Craven county in an unfair position, for no more loyal or patriotic party men can be found in North Carolina, the past records prove this, and now when there are no alarms from without, it is the height of absurdity for such actions as those which have recently taken place within the ranks.

With Craven county Democrats seeking honors for some of their own, at the hands of the convention, and in the next Legislature, the folly of the recent local naming and failure to name delegates, is not only apparent at this time, but it means disaster for this county's future attempts to secure the recognition it may seek, and which it is fairly entitled to seek and receive.
