### Craven County. THE COTTON OUTLOOK.

The season is now far enough advan ced to make approximate forecasts of the world's cotton yield for this year, and unless all present signs fall, the crop is going to be a record-breaker It is probable that the American crop will be somewhere between 11,000,000 and 12,030 000 bales, for the acreage is about 10 per cent greater than that of last year, with a gain in condition of 9. points over the government reports at a
