### GOOD RAINS FOR CROPS.

Weekly Crop Bulletin, For Week End- ing Monday, July 4th, 1904.

Rains in good amounts fell during the first half of the week in all sections of the State and gave vegetation in general a fresh and vigorous start. The rains were needed everywhere, particularly in the eastern section of the State, where droughty conditions prevailed for several weeks. In a few of the mid- dle counties, particularly Anson and Scotland, the rains were quite heavy, and caused considerable damage by washing corn and cotton fields on up- lands and by overflowing bottom lands. The last few days of the week have been warm with plenty of sunshine. The week on the whole was, therefore, an ideal one for the farmer.

Owing to the continued rains during the first half of the week, and the wet condition of the soil after the rains, very little progress was made in farm work, especially in turning over stubble fields, which is now in progress. The delay, however, is not serious, as the work at the close of the preceding week was well up, and both corn and cotton fields were clean and in excellent condition. Harvesting of spring oats continues with satisfactory results, that of wheat is practically over, except in the extreme western part of the State.

Corn and cotton fields, except those damaged by washing, have improved materially during the week; squares are beginning to form on the cotton plant, while the corn is already begin- ning to tassle. The squares are well filled, and the outlook appears very promising. A few correspondents in the middle counties report that some fields are already commencing to bloom. The yield of Irish potatoes is satisfac- tory; digging is nearly over in the east- ern counties; sweet potatoes are pro- mising. Tobacco continues thrifty, al- though slightly damaged in some places by worms. Peanuts are making no im- provements, and are considered a poor stand. The prospects for fruit are ex- cellent, except for apples, which con- tinue to drop from the trees.

## DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION—

### Intense Enthusiasm Shown For Cleveland.

John Sharp Williams As Temporary Chairman Makes a Sarcastic Speech Against Republican Party and Causes a Tremendous Clamor For Ex-President.

CONVENTION HALL.  
St. Louis, July 6.—The Democratic National Convention was called to order at 12.04 today; one o'clock, New York time. There are about 10,000 in the hall but more tickets have been issued. The delegates places are all filled. The balconies and galleries are well filled and the heat in the building is almost stifling.

The appearance of the California and Hawaii delegations with banners the signal for lead cheers. Bryan entered the hall at the head of the Nebraska delegation and was well re- ceived by the convention.

John Sharp Williams, of Mississippi as temporary chairman called upon Rev. John S. Cannon, of the Grand Avenue Presbyterian church to open the con- vention with prayer.

The general sentiment prevails that Parker will be the choice of the con- vention. Gorman is out; Olney may with- draw. It is said that the Parker sup- porters will consent to Hearst getting a complimentary vote if the adherents of Hearst will stop fighting Parker. The New York Journal claims 400 votes which will stick to Hearst, and oppose Parker in any event, causes the friends of Parker some little worry. It is ex- pected that the New Jersey delegation will declare for Parker.

The speech of chairman Williams was well received and aroused great en- thusiasm and laughter. He indulged in bitter sarcasm of President Roose- velt's praise of Elihu Root and charac- terized the latter's speech in praise of President as a piece of utter egotism. "If the ideals of the people" said the speaker, "and best expression in the Republican party, then God save us from those ideals." He said that Gen- eral Joe Wheeler was more in evidence at San Juan hill than was His Strenu- ously Teddy Roosevelt, and Joe Wheeler is a Democrat. In summing up his speech the speaker said that the con- vention's choice will act under the consti- tution for the good of all those at home and not for the exclusive good of the beneficiaries of the tariff.

He stated that while Root was secre- tary of War, he assumed the office of emperor ex-officio of the Philippines Is- lands. The Republican chairmen like the Republican party deals in boasts that the party is responsible for every good thing that God sends to the United States. The first real outburst of ap- plause was when the speaker mentioned the name of Grover Cleveland. It was the cause of a very uproarious demon- stration. "Crisis of Grover, Grover," came from every part of the house and the speaker was unable to continue for several minutes. Mr. Williams resumed his speech amid scenes of great confu- sion.

The Convention adjourned until to- morrow noon.
