> Burrus & Co's Cotton Letter. New Bern July 15th.

The cotton market opened alightly higher this morning, but immediately sold off on the heavy realizing by yester days buyers, and aggressive bear operations, realizing was mostly in the near by options, and while offerings were well taken by the market, yet prices reached some what under last night's closing. The trading was of a general character and wholly professional. Traders who usually operate for Phila, spot houses were moderate buyers of Dec and January. The weather map was regarded as more favorable than that of yesterday and this had some influence in the late positions. Sentiment around the room was hearish on the theory that a decline would be natural after the recent gains. The good demand for spot which was reported to have existed a day or two provious, seemed to have fallen off com pletaly today. It is very evident that apinners have entirely withdrawn from the market as buyers at the present high prices, and will not re-enter the market until prices have had a good reaction. In our optaion the price of cotton is high when the new crop deliveries get in the neighborhood of 10 cents and as long as conditions remain as they are, coston can safely be sold on all railles.


