NEW BERN'S DISTINGUISHED SON.

Dr Hannis Taylor, Son of the Most Brilliant Jurists of the World Once a New Bern Boy.

It may be true now as in Bible times that a prophet is not without honor save in his own country, and among the people of his own city. Be that as it may we doubt not that New Bern is proud to have among her distinguished sons, the Hon Hannis Taylor who was the leading spirit in the celebrated Alaska boundary case which he successfully conducted on behalf of the United States, recently.

Mr Taylor is a prominent lawyer of Washington and is especially noted for the authorship of an important book, The Origin and Growth of the English Constitution.

Mr Taylor's grand-father, William Taylor settled in America probably in 1790. His parents, Richard N Taylor were New Bern people, and the father was for many years an elder in the Presbyterian church. His wife was Miss Stevenson, aunt of M DeW Stevenson. William Taylor built the brick residence now occupied by R B Nixon.

Mr Richard Taylor moved to Mobile, Ala., in the early seventies and died there. He had three sons, two of whom are prominent in railroad business.

He has been highly honored by the University of Edinburgh which conferred on him the degree of Doctor of Laws this summer. At this occasion he was the guest of honor at a banquet given by a member of the faculty of that institution. We take pleasure in publishing extracts from the account of the affair taken from the Edinburgh Statesman, of July 9th.

A special graduation ceremonial was held yesterday by the Edinburgh University senate, when the honorary LL.D degree was conferred upon Mr Hannis Taylor, late minister plenipotentiary of the United States to Spain. The ceremony took place in the senate hall of the old university. Sir William Turner, vice chancellor presided. There was also a large attendance of the members of the senate, and a number of ladies were also present.

Dr Hannis Taylor, in the course of his reply, said that cold, indeed, would be his heart were it not pierced through and through by the cordial and generous welcome which had greeted him that day in the land of his forefathers. It was not strange, perhaps, that his heart should have been stirred by a tender emotion when he first crossed the frontier of Scotland on Wednesday last. More than a century ago two Scottish youths, William and Isaac Taylor, went away from their native town of Paisley to seek their fortunes in the new world. They settled at New Bern, in the State of North Carolina, where they founded two families. His father, the youngest son of William Taylor, was an elder in the Presbyterian church, full of reverence for the kirk and for the traditions of the mighty and romantic land from which his father came.

Strike Sympathizers Increased Chicago, July 27th.—All hopes of an immediate settlement of the strike at the yards ended this morning when every union packing teamster went out. This completes the tie up of the packing houses for the present. The teamsters voted to strike Sunday, but their forbade them to go out without the approval of the teamsters joint council. The packers claim they did not attempt to move a team. They have arranged to put on their twelve hundred horses on pasture and say they will handle the produce by rail. The packers notified retailers they must send to the warehouses for their supply of meat.

DISPENSARY DEFEATED

Wilmington Gives a Tremendous Victory For The Saloon.

Heated Campaign Ended With A Quiet Election In Which Full Vote Was Polled.

Special to Journal. Wilmington, July 17.—The election under the Watt's law after a very heated campaign resulted in a majority of 600 against dispensary today. The election was the most quiet ever known and a full vote was cast.

The best of feeling prevailed and there is no contest over the result. The majority in favor of distilleries being conducted in the corporate limits is 1,406; the dispensary people conceded their defeat as early as 3 o'clock today. They assign a number of reasons but charge no unfairness.

This morning there was a parade of boys around the polls with banners but the demonstration appeared to have had little effect.

Ladies served lemonade and lunch during the day from booths in the vicinity of the polls and in the fifth ward an organ was played and children sang gospel hymns.

The large majority was entirely unexpected but the saloon men are making no ado over the landslide.

Russia Gets Careless.

Washington, July 26.—The Japanese legation today received the following cablegram from the foreign office at Tokyo:

"The story told by the captain of the British steamer Tielman, which has arrived at Yokohama is as follows:—

"My ship on the way from Manila to Yokohama via Hong Kong was stopped by three Russian men of war July 24 at a point 29 miles off the coast of Izu and after an examination of the cargo was allowed to proceed to Yokohama. At the request of the Russians the Tielman took on board more than twenty sailors of the crew of the steamer Knight Commander and brought them to Yokohama.

According to the crew of the Knight Commander she met the Russian men of war on July 24 off the coast of Izu.
