NATIONAL GUARD ORDERS.

Campaign Songs in State. Auditor Dixon at Raleigh. Too Much Rain Feared.

Raleigh, Aug 4.—A general order from the office of Adjt. Gen. Royston directs that the First Infantry, North Carolina National Guard will proceed to Manassas Va., to participate in the maneuvers which begin there September 5th. Col. Robertson will on arrival report to Brig. General J. M. Lee, commanding First Brigade, second division. He is directed to keep in communication with deputy quartermaster general Jones at Atlanta, who has charge of the transportation of troops to the maneuvers, and to have his regiment in readiness on train at short notice. The surgeon general of the State will see that the regiment has proper medical attendance and supplies, and the quartermaster general of the State will supply the necessary tenting etc. The uniforms required will be that of the regular army. All the details of the trip will be left to Col. Robertson's judgment.

Governor Aycock returned today from Shelby where he addressed a large audience yesterday, in a political speech. He brought back a pocket full of campaign poems, the title of which is: 'I'm bound to vote for Parker, set to the air of Dixie' and written by Dr. E. E. Wharton. The poem sets forth that, 'We'll show to Teddy where his grave is, dug by Parker and by Davis.'

State Auditor Dixon says that his theme, in his address at Boston before the Grand Army of the Republic will be the Confederate soldier. He is very enthusiastic in regard to his visit. It is a critical time for the crops now and a good many of the farmers express considerable fear of too much rain, which would prove very injurious to cotton particularly.

The State will be no more elections on the prohibition or dispensary question until next year, as the law provides that none such shall be held within ninety days of the general election.

Capt. W. H. Day has so far improved that he expects to leave here Sunday for one of the resorts, in order to fully recuperate.

State Treasurer Lacy has gone to Caswell and Yadkin counties to make some Masonic addresses.

RUSSIANS IN LAST TRENCH

At Port Arthur. Fleet Tries To Break Japanese Lines. Still Chasing Alleged Contraband Vessels.

New Chwang, Aug 4.—According to the word received here the Russians at Port Arthur have been driven back to their last trenches. The Japanese have three hundred and fifty guns in trained action on the defenses.

London, Aug 4.—The St Petersburg correspondent of the Central News reports that the Russian auxiliary cruiser Donaur has left the Baltic sea in pursuit of one British and two Swedish vessels which are said to be carrying five sub-marine and seven torpedo boats in sections to Japan.

Tokio, Aug. 4.—Advices received today state that twelve torpedo boat destroyers and four torpedo boats and a number of gunboats emerged from Port Arthur Monday night, but were driven back by the Japanese.

Board met in regular monthly session Mayor Ellis presiding, aldermen present Smith, Avery, Dawson, Lane, McSorley, Wood, McCarthy and Gulon. Minutes read and adopted.

Chairman of Cemetery Committee reported that four feet of wall had been completed around Cedar Grove Cemetery and asked that a voucher be issued to pay for same at \$1.574 per foot as per contract.

Upon motion a voucher for \$300.00 was ordered to be paid out of cemetery funds for the amount \$1260.00

Chairman of Cemetery Committee asked for instructions relative to erecting a pavilion in Cemetery wall. Upon motion the matter was left with Cemetery Committee with power to act.

The condition of house on cemetery was presented to the Board by tenant Jacobson and upon motion the matter was referred to property committee.

By request of City Attorney Upon motion a voucher for \$300.00 was ordered made in favor of Attorney Payne of New York as retainer, relative to the Cemetery fund held in trust.

Upon motion the Sanitary officer was continued under the discretion of the Mayor.

Ordered that \$5.00 be deducted from amount due L. H. Banks month July for time lost.

Notice of damages to one Chas. Perkins by his horse falling through a bridge over a ditch on South Front St. thereby breaking the animal's leg, amount damage claimed against the city \$100 was read to the Board and upon motion was refused.

Claim of damage was read to the board for the killing of one Boss Cobb by coming in contact with electric wire in Feb 1904, presented by W. W. Clark, J. E. & R. O'Hara, attorneys for J. H. Fisher, Adm. of the estate of Boss Cobb.

Upon motion the Board refused to take any action in the matter. The Board a 32 C P Electric light placed at the junction of New and Short Sts.
