CAMPAIGN WORK

Beginning in Circulating Printed Speeches.

Big Melon Profit. Wine Merchants Move From State. Tobacco Crop Farmers Institute. North Carolina Speakers Abroad.

Raleigh, Aug. 6.—At Democratic headquarters the regular work for the campaign will begin about the 15th inst. Secretary Fields is very busy getting up mailing list and printing speeches and documents, in fact getting ready for doing all kinds of preliminary work. He is having printed a large number of copies of the plan of organization and also the plan for holding primary elections. In one document was printed the speeches of Senator Simmons, Governor Aycock and Congressman Small at Greensboro. John Sharp Williams speech at St. Louis will be also printed. A large issue of the Democratic hand book will be made. This is now being compiled by Senator Simmons, State chairman.

It is learned that one farmer at Laurinburg has netted \$18,000 on 110 acres of cantaloupes.

From D. J. Lewis of Halifax, deputy revenue collector who is here it is learned that Garrett & Company have removed the headquarters for their great scuppernon wine business from Weldon to Norfolk. This firm controlled the scuppernon wine trade in the world, and ships its products all over the United States, many carload lots going even to California. It has a regular warehouse at St. Louis. In the Medock vineyard in Halifax county there are 185 acres and it also controls the tokay vineyard at Fayetteville. It sends agents all over eastern North Carolina to buy grapes from the farmers and some days as many as 15 car loads of these are received. The wine house at Medock cost \$100,000, and is absolutely fire-proof.

Raleigh is to have another bank, to be known as the Wake County Saving Bank with W. W. Vass and others stockholders. It will be the seventh bank here and will be in the Commercial and Farmers Bank building. Raleigh has more banks than any place in the State.

From representatives of the American Tobacco Co. it is learned that the tobacco crop in this section will be a heavier one to the acre than that last year. There is a falling off of 50 per cent on the average, but the yield will be nearly 60 per cent of last year's crop. The opening breaks were held here yesterday and about 10,000 pounds were sold at the two warehouses, all primings and brought from 3 to 12 cts.

The next Farmers Institutes will be held in the northern part of the Piedmont section, in about twenty counties, including Alamance, Guilford, Forsyth, Davie, Catawba, Gaston, Lincoln, Person, Stanly, Stokes, Rowan, Rockingham, Caswell, Granville, Vance and Franklin.

After this tour the Institute holders will go to the mountains. State chemist Kilgore will go with them.

North Carolina will be very strongly in the North and west this season, by reason of the notably fine speakers who go to those sections, these including Governor Aycock who will make an educational tour of Maine. Auditor Dixon who will speak to the Grand Army of the Republic at Boston and Dr. Charles D. Melver who will speak in New Hampshire before the State Teachers Association which has 3000 members and also before the Teachers Association of Wisconsin.
