Tobacco sales at the Farmers' Warehouse are growing daily. The planters are satisfied with the prices paid, which are commensurate with the quality. The grades are getting better also. It is firmly believed that the standard of prices will reach that of former years very soon.

The Telephone Company is now getting in good work towards the completion of its system in this city, and once in order, the patrons will have a service equal to any in the South. There has been much to interfere with the phone people, but they have a sufficient force now engaged to soon assure the end of the work, which will be a matter of local rejoicing.

Mr J L McDaniel, the Broad street grocer showed the Journal a very large and peculiar looking grape yesterday. The average grape is supposed to be spherical but this one is an elliptic spheroid measuring four inches in diameter and is of the Latham variety.

Mr L H Outler of this city has been appointed by Judge Farnell, Jury Commissioner, his duties being to draw with the clerk of the court, the juries for the Federal courts in New Bern.

The local Republican leaders were distributing campaign buttons around to the faithful yesterday. The buttons were in shape of an ordinary lapel button, encased, bordered with the national colors, upon which appeared a vignette of Hon O R Harris, Republican candidate for governor. The design was quite artistic and the work well executed.

The mail train on the A & N C road Wednesday morning took an excursion party of about 100 colored persons, members of Ebenezer Sunday school, to Kinston. The excursionists remained over there last night to give an entertainment. A brass band and a jazz ball club was also along and a big time was anticipated.

Mr Edgar Royall has opened a green grocery store and refreshment stand at No 81 Middle street. Mr Royall has been with the Broad Street Fruit Co a long time but has now embarked in business for himself.

The low temperature yesterday on the coast change was 61 degrees.

Three new residences are going up at Riverside. One of them is having modern plumbing put in, showing that the people of this thrifty suburb are wanting city conveniences.

Mr H B Elliott, a cotton buyer of Jones county was in town yesterday and said that cotton was beginning to open a little in some places up there but picking would not begin until after September 1st, and no marketing will be done before the 10th. The crop is said to be unusually fine this season.

It was only by the merest chance that a serious accident didn't occur to the A & N C freight train at the Trent river warehouse yesterday. The down grade there is very pronounced and a long freight train backing in received such an impetus that the brakes failed to hold the wheels from slipping and the rear car was precipitated against the abutting frame with such force as to break it down, one side of the truck passing over suspending a portion of the car over the iron. Three feet further the car would have fallen on one of the bridge pilings and would probably done much damage.
