ONLY THE LEASE.

And Private Stockholders to Decide It.

First District Cases. State Charters Granted. Hot Politics. Mrs. Olds Sick. Judge Douglas Soon to Retire.

Raleigh, Aug 30.—Tomorrow the various bidders for the lease of the Atlantic & North Carolina railroad will all make their way towards New Bern, which will be their mecca. Everything as regards the lease of the Atlantic & North Carolina railway appears to be left entirely to the private stockholders, so far as an expression of opinion is concerned. The bidders who have been here a day or two, hoped that the Governor and board of internal improvements would settle the matter but the Governor declined to express an opinion. One of the members of the board of internal improvements opposes a lease, the other not having yet expressed himself. The matter was very much at sea, though really the preponderance of opinion seems to be that a lease will be effected. Some of the persons interested in what is known as the Kennedy bid, that is the one made by persons living along the line really do not want the road leased, but said that if it was to be leased, they might as well put in a bid as anybody.

Among today's arrivals were Congressman John H. Small of Washington, D. C. Cooper of Henderson, Frank D. Jones of Gulf, W. P. Roberts of Galesville, E. K. Bryan of Wilmington.

The Supreme court today took up the appeal docket for the first district. Among the attorneys present were G. W. Ward and E. P. Adair of Elizabeth City and W. D. Rodman of Charlotte.

State Auditor Dixon will return tomorrow from Fuquay Springs, where he has had a weeks rest, during which he has examined 2000 new pension applications, so as to be ready to submit these to the State pension board, with his opinion of the merits of each.

Charters are granted to the Speed Milling Company of Edgecombe county, to manufacture cotton oil, truck barrels and packages, etc., capital stock \$50,000, the D. G. Newberry Company, of Columbia, Tyrrell county, to deal in real estate and the Brown and Cannon Mercantile Company of Concord, capital stock \$100,000.

Mrs. Fred A. Olds, the President of the North Carolina Division United Daughters of the Confederacy is quite sick at her home here, with malarial fever.

One of the hottest inter-Democratic fights in progress in the State is that in this county, in which the question is whether the new nominees for county commissioners or the present ones shall be elected.

The questions asked the applicants for attorneys license by the Supreme court yesterday were prepared by Judge Douglas, who is so soon to retire. He devoted considerable attention to question regarding the U. S. Constitution. After Judge Douglas retires here there will be only one other Republican holding a State office, this one being ex-attorney general Z. Y. Waler who is reported to the Supreme court and whose term ends in February.

The Wake county Confederate veterans left this morning for the reunion at Asheville, with them going the only Confederate drum corps.

In Bad Shape.

Since then we have seen large plans for clearing rice but their mistakes for clearing and separating the chaff were very similar to that of the blind man of Jones county and this man had never seen a rice mill, nor even a grain of rice, and knew nothing about its work except by sense of touch, but he made a tolerable living however, by cleaning rice for his neighbors.

GOVERNOR SAYS GUARANTEE

For Bidders on A & N C Lease. Bidders Refuse To Notice This.

Raleigh, Aug 30.—It has been very difficult to ascertain precisely the exact amount of the bids for the lease of the Atlantic & North Carolina railway, but it may now be positively stated that the Howland and the Kennedy bids average 4 to 5 per cent, and the bid of the Atlantic Railway Company something over 5 per cent.

The Philadelphia syndicate has not perfected its bid and it appears it may be dropped out of the question. The Governor notified the syndicate that a deposit as a guarantee was prime necessity, but no attention has yet been paid to this notice.

OUR BUILDING BOOM.

The Sound of The Hammer and Saw is Heard in Every Direction.

There is scarcely a street in the city where there is not the sound of the vigorous strokes of the hammer heard either in the construction of a new house or the repairing or making additions to the old building. There has not been for many years such activity among the carpenters' trade as there is today.

This feature has been spoken of at various times and the boom continues undiminished. In fact, it is increasing. There has not been in many years a time when carpenters and masons were so busy as they are now.

Mr. George Roberts is building a ten room house on Metcalf street near New street.

Miss Anna Justice is building two house to rent on Change St.

On Dunn's field, our growing northern addition handsome residences are taking the place of the yawning wilderness with amazing rapidity.

The new home of Mr. J. S. Miller on A street is rapidly approaching completion.

Mr. Cleora Duncan is preparing to build a house on the opposite side of A street.

Mr. John Orabtree and Mrs. Abbott are among those who are making new houses in that section.

The house of Sheriff Biddle on New street is nearing completion as is also the house of Mr. Graham Richardson on Pollock street.

Then good progress is being made on the larger public enterprises, viz: The Methodist church, the opera house and the school house.

The slate roofing for the church has arrived and will soon be put on. The work on the interior is of such a nature that it requires time to show the progress that is being made but it is expected that it will be ready for dedication at the time announced.

The school house and opera house are required to be done at a specified time in the near.

The repairs on the Citizen's bank are being made rapidly and when completed will greatly improve the appearance of the block.

The First National bank building will soon have an overhauling. A new plate glass front will be put in, the position of the door changed and the lobby will be made differently. Contract has been made already for new bank furnishings which will be of the most modern and artistic design.

The stores also have had a general brushing up. Messrs O Marks & Sons are building a fine store on Broad street on which work is progressing well and the store of J. G. Dunn & Co is now in full charge of the carpenters, but when finished it will compare favorably with the handsome stores which are neighbors to it.

So we can see that New Bern is growing and that the available territory within the city limits is getting smaller.

Escaped Convict Caught

Government Report

Washington D. C., Aug 30.

In northern Alabama, and in southern parts of Mississippi and Louisiana cotton has improved and is in good condition in Oklahoma and in Indian Territory, but elsewhere the reports generally indicate unfavorable progress. Deterioration from rust and shedding reported from nearly all districts. Heavy rains injurious in portions of Florida, while over large part of Texas crops suffered from drought. In Texas boll worm also continue destructive and boll weevil are puncturing nearly all sugared in southwest and east coast district increasing divisions much damage as far north as Dallas, and Kaufman. Pickling in full progress in Texas and general in southern, central and eastern districts.
