RALEIGH.

Everybody Well Pleased at A. & N. O. Lease. No Falling Off in Dispersary Receipts. Republican Feuds

Raleigh, Sept. 3.—Universal satisfaction is expressed here at the lease of Atlantic & North Carolina railroad, to R S Howland. It was suspected all the while since his bid was put in that nothing would surpass it. He has many excellent plans, for the development of the road, for the keeping of the hotel open at Morehead City all the year round and making it a great winter resort and of filling the country along the line with a desirable class of immigrants. It is a very fine grazing country and a great deal can be done there in the way of stock raising.

State Chairman Simmons settles once for all the matter of a joint canvass with the Republicans. If the latter want a joint canvass they must have one all the way along the line. They want to pick certain men and put them in the field.

The Republican feuds in this congressional district have broadened to a very considerable extent and feeling runs quite high. The contest for the congressional nomination has brought all this matter to the front and now the State committee will have to lend a hand and clear away matters.

Manager W H Bachelor of the Raleigh dispensary, says there was very little falling off in the receipts during the month of August.

The revenue collections from this district last month were \$214,777, which is an increase of nearly \$20,000 over the same month last year.

It appears now that the Craig law, will again get before the Supreme court, so far as concerns that provision of it placing the power of attorney for all foreign companies in the hands of Insurance Commissioner Young.

The theatrical season opened here last night, in Metropolitan Hall; the Academy of Music not being quite ready for occupancy.

The corporation commissioners have begun their work of visiting the various tax assessors of the various counties in order to confer with and instruct them regarding the collecting and assessment of taxes. Chairman McNeil was at Durham today for this purpose.

State Chairman Simmons is now sending out a great deal of very interesting documents, to meet Republican charges.

Russians on the Run.

London, Sept. 3.—The Japanese legation have given out the following dispatch received in Tokyo from Field Marshal Oyama, reporting the retreat of the Russians under Kurapatkin from Liao Yang. The enemy being unable to resist our fierce attack began retreating on September 1st toward Liao Yang. Our left and central divisions are rapidly pursuing the enemy, who in great confusion are trying to retire to the right bank of the Taitse river. We have captured ten and a half centimetres of cannon which are now being used to bombard the Liao Yang railway station. On September 1st our right flank attacked the enemy at Pei Yang Tai fifteen miles northeast of Liao Yang. Our casualties since August 29th are ten thousand killed and wounded.

Rome, Sept. 3.—A Tokio dispatch says that Kurapatkin has ordered all the villages about Liao Yang to be burnt to prevent the Japanese getting supplies which are stored there. Four villages have already been destroyed, rendering a thousand Manchurians homeless.

Tokio, Sept. 3.—It is reported the city of Liao Yang is in flames. If the report is true it is probable the Russians fired the town before retreating over the Taitse river to prevent the Japanese obtaining stores which the Russians left behind.

London, Sept. 3.—The Central News learns that one of the British warships which have been searching for the Russian volunteer soldiers in the east and African waters, has returned to port, having failed to find the Russians. The British warships are endeavoring to find the Russian warships to transmit to them the St Petersburg message ordering the cessation of the stopping of steamers.

UNDER NEW MANAGEMENT

Atlantic & North Carolina Railroad Now Run By How and Improvement Company, Lessee.

At six a m, September 2nd, General Manager R P Foster of the Howland Improvement Co, the lessee of the Atlantic & North Carolina railroad, took possession of this property, and the State management ceased to exist.

The stockholders at their meeting at Morehead City, took recess after voting on lease. The directors of the road were not ready to report to the meeting until 11 p m Thursday, when the necessary matters regarding the lease were settled. On motion Dempsey Wood, a committee of two was appointed to revise the by laws of the A & N C and report at annual meeting. J A Bryan in behalf of directors submitted to the meeting a lease drawn by the directors, with recommendation it be adopted. On motion of H R Bryan, Jr, the lease as submitted was ratified by the stockholders meeting.

The lease was signed, sealed and delivered in open meeting, duplicates of the original copy be given to J W Granger for the State of N C, to J A Bryan, for A & N C Railway Co, and to R S Howland for Howland Improvement Co.

Under the Howland Improvement Co the present lessee of the A & C, the officers will be—President, R S Howland, R P Foster, General manager, S L Dill, Supt, M Manly, Secretary and treasurer.
