## NEEDED PAINT

Capital Building Interiors Receiving Attention.

Hall of History Features. Partridge Season] Tobacco Prices. State Literary and Historical Association. State Fair Mat-ters.

Raleigh, N. C., Oct. 13.—Painters are at work rejuvenating the old walls of the House of Representatives. The walls will be a light buff color and the ceilings white. It has been many years since the walls have been painted. The interior of the Governor's office has been repainted for the first time since the summer of 1893.

One of the new features in the Hall of History in the State Museum is an exhibit of pistols, illustrating the development of that weapon from the time of the Revolution to the present, beginning with one of the long and odd looking flint locks and ending with a mouser, 10 shot automatic, cited for one thousand yards, while the Revolutionary weapon would hardly kill much beyond fifty yards. If it ever hit anything. The mousers had been very kindly lent by the New York dealers, Von Lenzke and Detmold, and are certainly curiosities in the way of weapons.

Sportsmen find that there are plenty of partridges this season, though many of the birds are not half grown. It would be better if the open season for this shooting did not begin until December 1st as by that time all the birds would be fully grown.

The prices of tobacco at the ware houses here, are now quite satisfactory. This marks a victory for the growers, who said that they would cut the crop down so much that good prices would be the result.

Nine convicts from the penitentiary have been sent to the southern part of this county to cut wood under private contract. There continues to be a great demand for convicts for private work of all sorts.

Next Tuesday evening the fifth annual meeting of the State Literary & Historical Association will be held in its meeting place, the Raney Literary Assembly room, its president, Dr. C. Alphonso Smith of the State University presiding. The subject of his address will be "The Average American." Other addresses will be by Prof. D. N. Hill of the Agricultural & Mechanical College on North Carolina books issued during the last twelve months. John Charles McNeill of the Charlotte Observer on "Our State Literature;" and president F. P. Vonable on the University and its relation to State History. The features of the evening however, will be the reply to the charges made by Judge Christian of Richmond, Va. regarding North Carolina's part in the war between the States. This will be read by Chief Justice Walter Clark, the chairman of the committee of veterans which has prepared the reply. The latter is said to be remarkably complete and absolutely conclusive.

There are to be a great many events here during the State Fair next week, including the reunion of the Confederate Veterans, and the fourth annual tournament of the Gun Club, for the clay pigeon matches. The prizes are valuable.

## RUSSIANS OCCUPY YENTAL.

But Lose Five Thousand Men. Japanese Reinforcements Hurrying Forward.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 13.—The Bours Gazette says that at 10 o'clock yesterday morning the Japanese retired from their two lines near Yental and evacuated the Yental station, while the Japanese on the right wing were considerably weakened. The Japanese had withdrawn during the night, leaving the Russians to occupy Yental without fighting. Having thus turned the Japanese flank the Russians attacked a position of great strategic value which they occupied after a fierce fight in the Yental hills. The Japanese stubbornly resisted.

London, Oct. 13.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Rome, stated that messages received there, says during a fight in the vicinity of Yental Tuesday the Russians lost five thousand men. The Japanese reinforcements are being rushed northward, especially toward Kuroki, who is in danger of being surrounded by an overwhelming force of Russians.

## THE BAGPIPES.

They Were Used by the Early Greeks, Romans and Egyptians.

Bagpipes, mentioned in Jeremiah xlviii, 34. "Mine heart shall sound for Moab like pipes; like pipes for the men of Kir-harshati;" and elsewhere in Scripture, were used also by the early Egyptians.

Both Greeks and Romans knew the instrument, for a coin of Nero shows upon one side the tibia instrument, a bag with two reeds and nine pipes. Procopius also, who wrote about 550 A. D., asserts that Roman soldiers sometimes marched to the sound of the bagpipes, and it is not impossible that they introduced them into the British islands.

The earliest, more modern reference to them is in an Irish MS. of 1150, and an Irish illuminated MS. of 1390 depicts a pig playing on the bagpipes. The Scottish highlanders were the first and only people to use the great war pipe, and in spite of Sir Walter Scott's assertion, it is very doubtful whether they charged at Bannockburn to the "skirl" of the pipes.—London Answers.
