## RALEIGH

Showing of September Climate and Crop Report.

Editor Had to Decline Position. Government Gets Liquor Tax. Receivership Bill Costs. Cavalry Company to Organize.

Raleigh, Oct. 15.—It is learned that J. D. Eggleston, Jr., formerly Superintendent of public schools at Asheville, but now Superintendent of schools in Prince Edward county, Va., has declined the position of Editor of the Charlotte News on account of sickness. He is now in the hospital at Richmond, his disease being appendicitis.

The climate and crop report for this State for September was issued today. The most temperature for the State was 70 degrees, half a degree below the normal, the highest being 74, at Hatteras; the lowest 59 at Lynville. The highest absolute temperature was 90 degrees, on the 30th, at Lexington, and the lowest 81 degrees on the 10th at Lynville. The average rainfall was 3.26, which is a little over an inch below the normal. The greatest rainfall was nearly eight inches at Pittsboro, and the least a 3rd of an inch at Waynesville. The drought now prevailing in Central North Carolina and in fact over most of the State is specially referred to in the reports. It breaks all the records since 1887. There were killing frosts in parts of the mountain region as early as September 16th.

Revenue Collector Duncan who is looking after Republican politics for Eastern North Carolina will make a tour through his county, Carteret, and will visit all the precincts. He was talking today about the enforcement of the Waits law, and says that none of the State officials has ever examined what is known as record No. 10, in his office which shows the persons who have paid special taxes for the sale of liquor. He says that in nine cases out of ten where sales of liquor are made in Waits law territory the government has got its tax, the liquor being sold in defiance of the State law. In other words the Revenue department has seen that its law has been complied with and that the Federal tax has been paid. The records contain a complete list and is really the only thing open to the general public.

A bill of costs amounting to \$995 has been filed in the Federal court here in the receivership matter of John P. Caylor of New York against the Atlantic & North Carolina Railway. Exceptions have been filed by the attorneys for the railway.

A troop of cavalry is about to become a certainty here. The requisite number of men has been secured and application will be made to the governor for commission to organize as part of the North Carolina National Guard. It has been 18 years since there was a cavalry troop, this having been the Scotland Neck Mounted Riflemen. The State will of course, if the troop is admitted to the National Guard, uniform and equip it, but of course the members will have to furnish their own mounts, the State allowing pay for these only when the organization is on ordered tours of duty. Georgia is the only State in the United States which has a regiment of cavalry. Light batteries of artillery and troops of cavalry are necessarily much more expensive than infantry organizations.

## Howe's Moving Pictures.

Lyman H. Howe gave his moving picture exhibition at the New Masonic Theatre last night, and the general expression of those who were present and saw the pictures was, that it was all that it had been advertised to be.

Of all the splendid picture effects, that of the Great Life Boat scenes was probably the best in its wonderful realistic expressions of moving water. The pictures of the Japanese, St. Louis Exposition and Italy were all fine, as were the numerous pictures. There was applause and laughter throughout the exhibition which showed how the audience enjoyed the entertainment.

Mr. Howe has promised to show here again and a large audience is assured him if he comes.

Mr. W. T. Clift of Clark has accepted a position with Mr. R. L. Thornton, grocer on Middle street. Mr. Clift will remove his family from Clark to New Bern this week.
