## NEXT CHANGE

Speculation as to Next Governor's Actions.

Cattle Sale. Small Pox Increasing. Proposed Legislation. Pardon to be Asked For Wilcox. Sully's Bull Movement. Confederate Veteran Dead.

Raleigh, December 7.—Both Governor Aycock and Attorney General Gilmer are of the opinion that the United States Supreme Court will grant the request made by North Carolina for an extension of the date of the ordered sale of North Carolina railway bonds until April. Of course nothing has yet been heard from the court, but this is the opinion.

The prevalent opinion here appears to be that the next Adjutant General will be Thomas F. Robertson. Inquiries made of several persons elicited this reply. Of course the State officers know nothing about the matter. As yet no one appears to know who is to be the Private Secretary of Governor Glenn. The rumor was widely circulated that George P. Pell of Winston-Salem would get this place, but he says he knows nothing about it.

State Veterinarian Tait Butler says that W. B. Dale of Louisville, Ky., will sell 30 head of short-horned cattle at the Statesville soil test farm of the State Agricultural Department the 31st of next January. These are all to be registered cattle. Persons who wish to have the cattle they buy inoculated for tick fever can do so, at the seller's risk.

At the capitol all the officials and clerks are as busy as bees, and are working over time. There is no end of figuring, of which of course the Auditor and Secretary of State get the most. The Auditor has the pension warrants all ready for issue, and they will go out about the 15th.

The county superintendent of health of Wake, Dr. McCullers reports a very serious outbreak of small pox in the southeastern part of the county. He says he is working very hard to control it.

The State Board of Agriculture began its regular semi-annual session today. It will recommend the construction of a central power, heating and lighting plant at the Agricultural and Mechanical College, endorsing practically all the suggestions made by the special committee which this week looked into this matter.

A bill is to be introduced in the legislature amending the corporation commission act so that the commission will have charge of hotels, on the ground that the latter are in a way public, just as railroads and other common carriers.

The news that Governor Glenn is to be asked to pardon James Wilcox of Elizabeth City, convicted of the murder of Nellie Craypey attracts much attention. Two years ago it was extremely difficult to find any one who thought him innocent, but public opinion may have changed. He is serving a thirty years sentence and has behaved very well indeed.

Arrivals at the penitentiary are very light now; in fact they grow lighter all the time, as the counties take every conviction they can get. The last arrival is Andrew Betney, a negro who will serve five years for attempt to kill a merchant in Columbus county in whose store he had secreted himself at night. He shot at one of the merchants as the latter entered the store and permanently injured one of his arms.

The State board of pharmacy adjourned today after having examined fifteen applicants for license. It will be six days before the witnesses are announced.

A prominent cotton man here was asking the question today who would buy his cotton now and who would sell them. He says there are very interesting questions at the juncture. One man was heard to say that the North Carolina cotton growers had talked about putting a fund as a gift to Sully, who put prices last year, but that some persons now said that Sully had by this very act given the farmers a bad blow, by stimulating them to plant a great crop.

Late last night Robert Love died suddenly at the Soldiers Home here. He served in Company K Thirtieth Regiment N. C. His age was 84 years, and he had been in the Home only four months. He was buried this afternoon in the Confederate cemetery.

Upon motion the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That it be recommended to the Water and Light Commission that Water, Sewerage and Lights be furnished free of charge to the public graded schools of the city, and that said companies be requested to establish and maintain upon the Academy Green an Arc Light for the use and protection of said property.

By the Board of Aldermen of the City of New Bern, be it, ORDAINED:—

Section 94: That no switching or backing of cars or engines upon the tracks of railroads upon the streets of the city shall be allowed, but cars or engines within one block and the width of the intersecting street distance of a railroad crossing in the street within ten minutes before, nor within ten minutes after the scheduled arrival of another train carrying passengers; nor within a like period of time of the actual arrival or departure of another train carrying passengers. That for each violation hereof the corporation which permits the same and each person engaged therein shall be fined \$10.00.

Section 97: That no steam locomotive fired and with steam up shall be permitted to stand upon the street in the city for a longer period than five minutes. Provided that this shall not apply to Queen street east of a point fifty feet east of the intersection of Green street over to Hancock, north of Queen street. That for each violation hereof the corporation operating the engine and each person handling the same shall be fined \$10.00.

Be it Ordained, That it shall be unlawful for any person to injure, break, cut, damage or destroy any of the Electric Lights, poles, wires, or other fixtures or appliances used in connection with the Electric Light plant or fire alarm system, whether the same is the property of the City or the property of any other person, firm or corporation, and whether the same is located on public or private property of the City.

Any person convicted of a violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined \$20 dollars or imprisoned for 20 days.

Sec. 138. Be it Ordained, That it shall be unlawful for any person to injure, deface or destroy any property owned, occupied, or used by, or for any of the public schools of the city.

Any person adjudged guilty of violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined \$20 dollars or imprisoned 10 days.

Sec. 139. Be it Ordained, That it shall be unlawful for any person to injure, break, cut, damage or destroy any of the Electric Lights, poles, wires, or other fixtures or appliances used in connection with the Electric Light plant or fire alarm system, whether the same is the property of the City or the property of any other person, firm or corporation, and whether the same is located on public or private property of the City.

Any person convicted of a violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined \$20 dollars or imprisoned for 20 days.

Sec. 140. Be it Ordained, That it shall be unlawful for any person to injure, break or destroy, or in any manner interfere with any of the water pipes, mains or other appliances used in connection with the Water or Sewerage plants of the City of New Bern whether the same shall be laid in the streets of the City or connected with any private or public lot or building in the city.
