SHORT PASSING EVENTS

Much needed repairs to the roadway were being made yesterday on South Front street between Craven and Middle streets.

The rod supporting the weather vane on the Court house is so badly bent to the northeast that the vane points most of the time to the southwest. Can it not be straightened?

The Daughters, after much solicitation, have consented to have their play, Under the Southern Cross, repeated and it will again be given at the theatre shortly after the holidays.

The contractor for the Pamlico Railroad stated yesterday that two miles of track are laid, and that the roadbed through the pocosin near the Latham tract is ready for the ties. He said also that only one fifth of the Nense bridge is to be built, and that work is being pushed as rapidly as possible.

On account of the inauguration of Governor Glenn on January 11th, the Atlantic and North Carolina Railroad will sell reduced rate tickets from all points on its line to Raleigh and return. Tickets will be on sale beginning January 8th, with final limit January 13th. The rate will be one first class fare plus 25 cents, for the round trip. For military organizations a rate of one cent a mile will be given. The indications now are that a large number of people from the Eastern section of the State will attend the inauguration.

MURDERER ARRESTED

Officer Lupton Captures Colored Man at Station. Claims Self-Defense.

As the Shoo Fly train stopped here yesterday morning, a colored man got off and was quickly taken in charge by officer Lupton. The man was Charlie Bozeman and he is charged with the murder, some three or four weeks ago of his brother-in-law John Bozeman, the murder taking place in Lewiston, Bertie County.

Bozeman admitted the killing to officer Lupton, but claimed that his brother in law had come at him with a roll while they were quarreling and he shot him in self-defense with a single barrel breach loading gun. Bozeman did not want to go to jail and offered his captor money to be released.

Officer Lupton had been watching for this man for several weeks and picked him out by the description sent here. He was lodged in the county jail.
