### NO ALARM HEARD.

Bucket Brigade Saves House From Destruction.

Yesterday morning at 8:45 there was an alarm of fire from box 59. The usual crowd of dogs, and small boys gathered about the doors of the engine houses, barking, and watching for the horses to appear and get away with the hose wagons.

It was several minutes before the horse for the hook and ladder truck had got away with its wagon. Meanwhile the fire was going on and those interested took up arms, formed a bucket brigade and with active work, put out the fire, which if left until the hose wagons came would have destroyed much property.

After the fire had been extinguished, search was made for the horses which were supposed to be for fire services, and they were found to be at work hauling dirt on N street, beyond all hearing distance of the fire bell. The danger in a fire system which takes such chances as this, and in wintry weather, when fires are most likely to occur, needs no pointing out. If the fire had been in a business block or mill, the consequences would have been very serious, beyond estimation, as no bucket brigade could have done this work.

The fire was in the residence of J. E. O'Hara, and while it looked serious for the house at one time, the bucket brigade worked hard and saved the property with about \$50 loss, with insurance to cover it.

### TWO CASES IN CHAMBERS.

Alleged White Carping and Incendiarism From Greene County

There were heard in Chambers yesterday, by Judge H. R. Bryan, two cases brought here from Greene county, the first being a case of alleged white carping, in which "O. J. Best, colored brought accusation against J. F. Britt, J. S. Taylor, S. L. Lynch and Emmett Lynch all white, who Best claimed assaulted him and badly injured him on the night of Dec. 21st. The case came from Greene county on a bench warrant. Best gave his testimony, and there were a few witnesses in his behalf. The defense offered no testimony. The defendants were bound over in bonds of \$700 each, same to be given before the clerk of the Superior Court of Greene county, for their appearance at next term of criminal court in that county.

The case seemed to be the outgrowth of a previous land suit. Ex-Judge Robinson appeared for the defendants, and Capt. Swift Galloway and George Lind say, Esq., represented Best. The other case was one of habeas corpus, Ed Walters, colored, claiming he was unlawfully held in custody, the crime for which he was charged being house burning on November 16th, and the building one he occupied. The case was continued to Greene county, next term of court, Walters bond being reduced from \$300 to \$100.

### COMPULSORY EDUCATION

For Wake County, Probably Other Counties.

Associations of Two Carolina Combines Offices at Raleigh. More Court of Inquiry. Big Lemons. All Ready for Glenn. Tomperance vs Liquor.

Raleigh, Dec. 29.—The public school committee of Raleigh township will ask the legislature to enact a compulsory education law for the public schools in the township. Editor J. W. Bailey of the Biblical Recorder is appointed a committee to cover it. There is little doubt that a compulsory education law will be enacted before long covering all the Western N. C., counties, and then such laws for some communities in the east.

The Retail Merchants Association of North Carolina and the association of wholesale dealers, millers and manufacturers of North and South Carolina have transferred their offices to Raleigh, and Norman H. Johnson will be in charge of all. He will continue to conduct his private law practice at Burlington.

At the request of Col. W. F. Craig, of the Third Regiment of the North Carolina National Guards, a court of inquiry is ordered to convene at the office of the adjutant general here Tuesday Jan. 31 to investigate the accident Aug. 19th last, which resulted in the killing and wounding of certain soldiers of Company A 3rd Regiment, while on a train near Goldsboro, the inquiry being only so far as Col. Craig may be connected with the matter. The court will make a report of the evidence adduced, and also a statement of facts and will render its opinion. The following officers composed the detail of the court:—Col. T. H. Bain, Walker Taylor, and T. F. Robertson. Capt. W. F. Moody is recorder.

Mr. W. Ernest Duncan, a brother of Revenue Collector Duncan this year grew forty lemons of very great size upon a tree at his home at Beaufort, and sent one of these to your correspondent who today placed it in the agricultural building. The lemon is twelve inches in circumference and weighs almost 17 ounces. It is one of forty of the same size grown upon the tree in the open air and was picked Christmas day.

When Gov.-elect Glenn comes here he will find excellent preparations made for him, and when Governor he occupies the executive mansion he will find the building beautifully refitted. The ceiling has been repainted by artists who came here especially for the purpose, the walls have been done in tapestry, and the floors have been re-carpeted and everything will be in beautiful shape and never before has the mansion been so attractive. The new Governor and his family are extremely agreeable people and will of course receive a warm welcome at the hands of the people of Raleigh.

The temperance advocates in the State are preparing themselves to fight the attempt of the liquor forces to undo all that has been done in the way of a liquor legislation.

Gaston Butt, the negro who murdered another negro South of here and who fled at once, has been heard in Johnson county, but people who saw him failed to arrest him.

### Late War Reports.

London, Dec. 29.—Baron Haysashi received a telegram from Tokio today announcing that the Port Arthur besieging army captured on Wednesday night Fort Terlingham. The capture is regarded here as of the highest importance and will materially hasten the fall of the fortress.

Ottawa, Dec. 29.—Dispatch from St. Petersburg says the commander in chief of the Black Sea fleet has ordered 20 sailors to be court-martialed. The charges against them is mutiny.
