Attorney-General Moody began a suit by petition of the United States District Court at St. Paul on behalf of the United States against the General Paper Company and other companies asking that they be enjoined from continuing the combination.

President Gompers and Secretary Morrison of the American Federation of Labor called on Secretary Taft and urged the employment of Porto Ricans, as far as possible, in the construction of the Panama canal.

It is announced that Bolivia has offered the \$10,000,000 indemnity paid by Brazil to settle the Acre dispute to Americans who will develop that country.

Foreign correspondents from Port Arthur declare that the fortress is the strongest which ever was attacked, and comprise it to six bastions all situated on a hill arranged in mutually supporting groups, connected by tramways and telephones and backed by a mass of walls making the movements of the troops from one another.

The Bureau of Yards and Docks, Navy Department, awarded the contract for the completion of the drydock at the Mare Island Navy Yard to the Southfield Company, of Philadelphia. The amount of the contract is \$1,892,000, and the drydock is to be completed in 33 months. This will be the largest drydock in the United States Navy.

Mr and Mrs Jarman left this morning for New Bern where they will make their home.
