IT IS ORGANIZED

State Assembly Opens and Officials Are Named.

Applicants for Places—Guion First Speaker From Craven in Three-Quarters of a Century—Every Representative and Senator Present Breaks All Records.

Raleigh, Jan. 4.—There were busy scenes around the Capitol today, both Houses of the Legislature convening at noon. The number of applicants for places was as large as ever. Two-legged ex-Confederates got places, these being doorknockers Jno. P. Kerr of Caswell and David James of Pitt. Speaker Guion of the House received many compliments upon his election. He is the first speaker from the county of Craven in three-quarters of a century.

At the opening of the Legislature today every Senator and Representative was present; the first time this ever occurred at the opening. In the Senate A. J. Maxwell was elected unanimously, all Republicans voting for him; the same being the case with Walter L. Cohoon as reading clerk, and Brown Pegram, sergeant-at-arms; J. W. Simpson, engrossing clerk.

The Democrats nominated Senator Webb for president, pro tempore. He was given 40 votes, the Republicans giving W. S. Pearson 8. A resolution was offered for canvassing the vote for State officers next Monday. Webb offered a resolution requiring all bills to be typewritten and in duplicate, which was immediately adopted. Bills were introduced to increase the salaries of all judges, and establish the salary of the Governor.

Lieut. Governor Turner presided over the Senate. Principal clerk Frank Hackett called the House to order, and Chief Justice Clark administered oaths. W. A. Graham was made Speaker pro tem. O. H. Guion was elected Speaker, getting 95 votes; Crisp, of Caldwell, Republican, 22. Guion made a bright speech of acceptance. Frank Hackett was elected chief clerk by acclamation, also F. B. Arendell reading clerk, M. D. Kinsland, engrossing clerk, John H. Kerr sergeant-at-arms. Graham, Warren, Cunningham, Uzzell and Robinson were named as the committee to notify the Governor that the Legislature was organized.

GLENN'S INAUGURATION.

To Take Place In Rotunda of Capital.

Raleigh, Jan. 4.—It appears to be probable that the inauguration of Governor Glenn will take place in the rotunda of the Capitol. It will be the first time this ceremony has been held there. It was taken place in the Hall of the House at both the east and west porches. The citizens committee on the inauguration met this afternoon. Adjutant General Royester sent out today to all the companies of the National Guards and to the Divisions of the Naval Reserve invitations to be present at the inauguration. The staff of Gov. Aycock were also invited to be present.

Fire Record for 1904.

The fire record for New Bern for the year 1904, shows that a total of 48 alarms were sent in, 39 being actual fires and 9 false alarms.

The total fire losses for the year were \$2,500, the Simmons & Hollowell Co's fire being \$7,100 of this total, which would leave a loss of \$1,800 for 37 fires, a splendid showing, and ahead of previous records.

PROTEST AGAINST PARDON

Of Governor By Board County Commissioners Proceedings of January Meeting.

The board of Commissioners met at the Court House Monday January 2nd 1905 in regular session.

Present commissioners, Foy, Wadsworth, Richardson, Harvey and Barrington.

On motion Commissioners Harvey and Wadsworth were appointed a committee to investigate the cost and necessity of building a bridge across Swift Creek swamp at Beaver dam in the 1st township, and to report to the board at its next regular meeting in Feb'y.

Ordered that on payment of the proper tax and interest, on property listed by Peter Murrill of 8th township, which said property was sold for taxes, deed to which is recorded in book K, page 186, and deed to be cancelled.

Ordered that the valuation of the property of G. R. Brewer in 9th township be changed to \$500 on account of error.

Ordered by the board that Commissioner Harvey be and is hereby appointed a committee to act with the assessors of No. 1 township to settle the matter of the valuation of the property of J. F. Causey and others in said township.

On motion board took recess until 1:30 p. m.

The board met at 2:30 o'clock p. m. Jan 2nd 1905 pursuant to recess.

Present Commissioners, Foy, Wadsworth, Barrington, Richardson and Harvey.

Ordered by the board that the item \$1,500 "money on hand" listed to W. T. Civilis of 8th township be reduced to \$150 on account of error.

Mr. F. A. Fulcher presented his bond as County surveyor which upon examination was accepted and ordered filed and recorded thereupon Mr. Fulcher took the proper oaths and entered upon his duties as county surveyor for the ensuing term.

Mr. F. B. Erout presented his bond as Treasurer of the County for the ensuing term, which was accepted and ordered filed and recorded and upon taking the proper oaths he entered upon the duties of the said office of Treasurer.

Ordered that the valuation of the property of John H. Whitford on Change St. be made \$1,000 on account of error.

The annual report of W. M. Watson, clerk of the court after having been examined by Commissioner Richardson to whom it was referred at the last meeting, was accepted and ordered filed and recorded.

Ordered that three acres of land, the property of Laura Cooley of 8th township be assessed at \$100.

Ordered that the valuation of the property of P. L. Thomas on New St. be changed to \$1,800 on account of error.

Ordered that the property listed to P. L. Thomas at 20 Change St. be stricken from the list on account of error.

Ordered that the valuation of property of L. H. Cannon on Change St. be made \$600 for the year 1904 and that the clerk of this board notify the list taker of the 8th township to list the same for the year 1905 at \$1,000.

Ordered that the items \$500 "money on hand" and \$300 "furniture" listed to Mrs. Annie L. O'Day be stricken from the list, and that the same be listed to Mr. S. L. Dill; it appearing that said property has been listed to Mrs. Annie L. O'Day, through error.

Ordered that the clerk serve a notice on Mr. L. S. Grant, Supt. of the Home Tel. Co. to appear before the board and show cause if any he has why the property should not be listed for taxation.

Ordered that the contract for furnishing ra lines to the county poor for the 1905 be and is hereby awarded to McGehee & Willis at the price of 12c per ration, that being the lowest bid received by the board for the same.

On motion board took recess until 10 o'clock A. M., Jan 3rd 1905.

The board met at the Court House Tuesday Jan 3rd 1905 at 10 o'clock a. m. pursuant to recess.

Present Commissioners, Foy, Richardson, Barrington, Harvey and Wadsworth.

Ordered by the board that the clerk of the board be and is hereby authorized to purchase a Remington type-writer for use in the office of the Register of Deeds and that he is also authorized to adopt the new system of loose leaf record books manufactured by the McMillan Book Co. for use in said office. All Commissioners voting for same.

Ordered by the board that the board that the property of G. D. Bradham on Change St. recently owned by Geo. T. Wisfield be assessed at \$500.

Ordered that the valuation of the property of F. S. Duffy on East Front St. be changed to \$4,500 on account of error.

The report of Dr. J. F. Shaw, Dept. of Health, upon being read was accepted and ordered filed and recorded.

Ordered that the valuation of property of Mrs. Alice Duffy on Eden St. be changed to \$700 on account of error and valuation of her property on West St. be returned to \$275.
