MANY LEGISLATIVE BILLS.

Passed and Introduced. Judges and Jurors Pay Increase.--Want all Divorce Legislation Repealed.

Raleigh, January 16.--In the Senate, a memorial from the Western, N. C. Methodist conference was read, declaring that present divorce laws seriously threatened the sanctity of marriage, praying for special legislation against anti-scriptural ones, and asking that all enacted legislation since 1888 be repealed.

Bills passed, incorporating the Winston Salem Southbound railway and the Durham and South Carolina railway.

A bill was introduced for registering names, and placing headstones at all graves of deceased Confederate soldiers in every county in N. C.

Bills were introduced in the House to prevent fraudulent compromise of suits; to procure speedy trials in civil actions; to increase salaries of judges, to \$3,000; to increase pay of jurors in magistrates courts, from twenty-five to fifty cents per day; to give homesteaders the right to select a tract of land other than the one first assigned them, should they prefer; to make a transportation company issuing a receipt for freight responsible in a suit or claim for loss or damage; to provide that a criminal case shall stand for trial the first term, if summons and verified complaint are issued, and served thirty days prior to court; to give a lawyer appearing on a contingent fee a lien on the judgment.

SCHOOL HOUSE BURNED.

Total Loss by Fire of Colored Graded School Building.--Building Tended to School.

A very serious fire in every way, occurred here yesterday, resulting in the total destruction of the large frame two story building on West St., occupied by the Colored Graded School.

The first alarm was about 11:30 a. m., and the fire was found to be around a defective flue. (The fire was thought to be extinguished and the scholars in that wing of the building were sent home. The regular school closing was at 2 p. m. and in less than thirty minutes after wards, flames were seen coming from the building. The fire had worked between the walls, which were sealed, and secured such hold that before they could be gotten under control, the building was completely wrecked.

The loss is placed at \$3,000, although it is estimated that the building could not be replaced for less than \$4,500. There was \$1,600 insurance. It is expected that the school trustees will be termed in a day or two what will be done about continuing the school.

An official of the New Bern College; State Industrial Institution, colored, called at the Journal office, just after the fire, and said the use of their building was tendered the Graded School management so far as they could use it, while other arrangements were being made. A very thoughtful and considerate act, and it may be that the offer can be accepted, for some of the school grades.

Beats Cotton Raising

Zorah, N. C., Jan. 10, 1905.

For the benefit of farmers and chicken raisers. In order to ascertain something about the egg production in our county I have kept account of all the eggs I have bought since Jan. 1, 1904 to Dec. 31 of the same date which amounted to 2901 dozen. I sold those eggs to Lucas & Lewis for \$955.16 which made an average of a small fraction over sixteen cents a dozen the year through.

There were two other stores in my immediate neighborhood buying eggs the same year, which of course would increase the amount wonderfully.

I am sure the eggs I bought were raised in a radius of two miles. Besides the eggs that all the stores bought a good many were carried to New Bern and other places. I think the egg production of our neighborhood is worth as much as a crop of six cent cotton, so let us increase the egg traffic and diminish the cotton acreage. SILAS FULCHER
