### MONSTER PETITIONS.

Before Legislature, To Collect Debts And Against Merchants Purchase Tax. Great Deal Liquor Agitation.

Raleigh, Jan. 24th, 1904.

Two monster petitions have been presented to the legislature by the merchants of North Carolina and next Friday they are to have a hearing before the legislative committee. One petition has five thousand signatures and asks for the enactment of a law for garnishment or some other strong method of collecting debts. The other petition has seven thousand signatures of merchants and asks the repeal of what is known as the Merchants Purchase Tax, this being a tax which is levied upon the amount of purchases and which the merchants claim is really a double tax and hence unjust. This Merchants Purchase tax has been a subject of much interest all over the country and it seems there was such a tax nowhere else but in North Carolina. The Retail Merchants Association of the State has taken up both these matters and will present the petitions, 350 representative members of the association to be present. The state auditor has recommended the repeal of the part of the revenue act which levies the tax upon purchases and there is very strong pressure outside of the merchants for such a course.

Liquor regulation legislation is receiving a very great amount of attention at the hands of the legislature and the importance of the matter led to the coming here of Democratic State Chairman Eimmons, from Washington in order that there might be a full conference in regard to the whole subject. Some scores of bills have been introduced and others are to come, but the Democratic caucus will very fully decide upon the course to be pursued. The religious denomination joining with the Anti-Saloon League and together these form a most powerful organization to sweep liquor out of the state. There will not be a general prohibition law, this statement being made by persons in a position to know, but there will be laws very considerably extending the prohibition area, which now covers almost exactly four-fifths of the state. There will be an increase in the number of dispensaries, but this will not be large. While the dispensary system is thought to be much superior to the open saloon, yet it has some strong opponents. One of the great objects in the liquor legislation is to take that matter entirely out of the hands of those who have played upon it for political purposes or who would attempt to do so. The same view prevails in regard to the question of the public education of the negro. Of course there are extremists who do not want the negro educated at all.

### EDUCATION BEFORE LEGISLATURE.

Good Deal This Week—The Ransom Statute—North Carolina Well Represented at New Orleans.

Raleigh, Jan. 24.—This will be a notable week for educational matters here. The committee of the North Carolina Teachers Assembly on legislation will meet Wednesday afternoon at the office of State Superintendent Joyner and in the evening will meet with the House and Senate committees on education. The committee of the assembly is composed of Chairman F. P. Venable, Geo. T. Winston, Charles D. McIver, E. C. Brooks, W. A. Ragdale and O. L. Coon. The State Association of Superintendents of public schools will meet on Saturday. The State Board of public school examiners, of which J. Y. Joyner and Messrs. Foust, Noble and Stevens are the members will meet this week to consider matters relative to the managements etc. of the four negro State Normal Schools.

The Teachers Assembly of North Carolina will this year meet at some point in the interior of the State and not at a coast resort, it being felt that there is to be such a change from time to time. Much interest is felt in the bronze statue of General Matt W. Ransom which it is proposed to erect in the Capitol Square. Many noted artists will compete for the design. State Auditor Dixon is receiving a number of letters on this subject, from various parts of the country. There will be a competitive contest as there was for the design of the Vance statue. The artist who designed the latter statue died four years ago.

There was presented to the Senate today a gavel of apple wood, from a tree which grew in Rutherford county at the spot where the first court there was held. The gavel is a gift from George M. Dickson, the clerk of the court of that county, who sent it to Lt. Governor Winston.

The daughters of the Revolution here have arranged for a "kerness" which will be arranged by James Wrenn of Salisbury. It will be something new here.

The Anti-Saloon League members are very much pleased that the charter of Myrtle, which is a "distillery town" in Brunswick county is to be put out of business. It is one of those created two years ago. It may be that some of the others will be knocked out also.

North Carolina is certainly well represented at the tobacco growers convention at New Orleans. The growers in this State, even though in very retired sections, are keeping a very close watch on the cotton situation, and agents of the Farmers Association are going among them, getting pledges and talking freely about standing up for reasonable price.

ST. PETERSBURG IN DARKNESS.  
Strikers Defeat Troops Sent Against Them.—Trouble at Moscow.  
St. Petersburg, Jan. 24.—The city spent the night in terror. The city is in entire darkness. The revolutionists got possession of a lot of bombs and a large quantity of petroleum. The troops sent from here to turn back twelve thousand armed strikers from the Capitol works have been defeated, and the army of strikers are now close on the city. They looted a rifle factory before leaving Caploff and also a dynamite factory.

Moscow, Jan. 24.—The strikers are spreading rapidly. All the printing works have been stopped. No news, papers will be issued tomorrow. At noon the strikers numbered ten thousand. The police ordered all the arms removed from the windows of gunsmiths, the majority of whom closed their shops.

The Electric Light Glimmer  
Gas consumers and oil burners had the good thing over those who had to depend on the city for electric light. As usual it was a dark day and lights were wanted early, but the incandescent gas gave enough of a glimmer, so they could be seen, but no light.

Store people had a poor ending of the day, and there was enough to disgust every one who pays for a light that fails when most wanted. There seems to be no remedy for the consumer, but should be, in the poor light service given.

### GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

Says Absolute Necessity For Building Improvements

Lively Committee Discussion Over Dutch Nets In Pamlico River. Bills Streaming In of Every Kind From All Directions.

Raleigh, Jan. 24.—There was a large crowd and heavy debate before joint fish committee this afternoon, over Lampkins House bill to prevent use of dutch nets in Pamlico river. Committee reported it unfavorably.

Governor Glenn sent a message to Legislature saying there was absolute necessity for more space and a safe building for the valuable records and documents, and for the quarters of the Superintendent of Public Instruction and Insurance Commissioner, declaring the Supreme court building was not safe or suitable for such records. He recommended enlarging the capital building, or erecting a hall of records.

Many petitions were presented for the repeal of the Merchants Purchase Tax. Bills were introduced to allow the Governor to grant conditional pardons, to repeal Merchants Purchase Tax; to relieve Board of Agriculture from contributing to expense of the Agricultural & Mechanical College at Raleigh; to erect a hall of records; to provide a hall in each county for Confederate veteran meetings; granting pensions to all soldiers who are unable to labor.

There was discussion of Odell's bill increasing by \$97,000 the amount of Confederate pensions, so as to give fourth class pensioners and all widows \$30 annually. This class now receiving as much as the law directs.

It was announced that the Auditor said the increases would not increase taxes. The bill was made special order for Friday week.

In the House memorials from Protestant Episcopal church, and Friends or Quakers for repeal of all divorce laws was presented. Bills were introduced to extend until January 1, 1907, the time for settling State debt; to provide State board of examiners for barbers; to prohibit public drunkenness; bills regulating sale of property in continent remainder; and to pay State Treasurer Lucy \$274.00 stolen from him by William H. Martin, clerk under his predecessor.
