SMALL POX SPREADING.

Improvement in Capitol Square.--197 Banks in Operation.--Compulsory Education for Sun combo--Normal School Directors.

Raleigh, Jan 28.--The State Board of Education, of which the Governor is the chairman, has elected T. S. McMillen of Hertford a director of the State Normal & Industrial College at Greensboro to succeed W. J. Shaw, resigned, and B. F. Aycock, a director to succeed himself. Gov. Glenn has recommended to the Senate as other directors S. M. Gattis of Hillsboro, James Sprunt of Wilmington and H. C. Malone of Newton.

The Governor was very anxious to have the grounds of the Capitol, and particularly the walks, which latter are now in very bad order, placed in proper condition, and as his instance Representative Olive has introduced a bill in the legislature providing for placing the Square in proper condition.

Today a special committee representing the association of city school superintendents met with State Superintendent Joyner to arrange for reports to be made to the State Superintendents by all the city schools. This will be done as an act of courtesy, the law not requiring such reports. Heretofore these have not been made, and as a result, nothing about the city schools, which have many thousands of pupils, and on which \$20,000 is annually expended, appears in the reports of the State Superintendent.

Secretary Richard H. Lewis of the State Board of Health is much pleased at the prompt passage of a bill to allow Hendersonville exemption from the requirements of analysis of its water supply. The inspection of water supplies costs only \$60 a year and Secretary Lewis says that all such supplies ought to be watched with great care and analyzed frequently. The supply at Hendersonville is of remarkable purity, but of course no one can tell when it or any supply may become contaminated. The other day a sample of water from a town in the Piedmont section was received here for analysis and was found to be very bad. Upon inquiry it was found that instead of having the sample taken by a competent physician, a negro employe had been sent to get it and that he took it from a horse trough, using an unwashed bottle of course not cleaning his hands. Upon this discovery another sample was properly taken and found to be all right.

Speaking of small pox, Secretary Lewis said it was now in thirty one counties and is spreading. He says the remedy is upon the development of a case the county commissioners and board of Health ought to have compulsory vaccination in a radius of two miles. This is the way to quickly stamp out the disease.

Prof. Tighe, Superintendent of Ashe County Schools is in the Capitol conferring with the Senator and Representatives of Buncombe in regard to the preparation of a bill for compulsory education in Buncombe county, to be submitted to a vote of the people. The bill will also include a \$50,000 bond issue with a special tax of 5 cents, on the undred dollars for providing ample school fun is should the compulsory law become effected.

JUST BILLS

And These in Constant Streams.

Some Confirmations of State officials. Committee to Consider South Dakota Bond Matter. Prescriptions Only by Licensed Pharmacists. National Anti Jug Law.

Special to Journal. Raleigh, Jan 28.--A joint resolution was introduced in the Legislature today by Major General Robert F. Hoke a resolution. Bills were introduced to place tables marking positions of North Carolina troops at Bethel and Chickamauga, to provide a reformatory for young criminals; to require railways to deliver freight with reasonable promptness; regulating manufacture and sale of liquor in the State.

Bills passed increasing punishment to carry concealed weapons, making it a fine of \$20; to protect fish in all North Carolina waters. A resolution was adopted creating a committee to consider the South Dakota bond matter.

The Senate in executive session confirmed the nominations of James R. Young, Insurance commissioner, John D. Bigger, R. P. Stancil and J. M. Parrott, directors of Central Hospital for the Insane at Raleigh. J. I. Davis, Charles H. Arnold and Joseph Jacobs to be directors of the hospital for the Insane at Madison.

In the House bills were introduced by Ruth, Republican) to repeal the act of 1903 appropriating \$200,000 for education, and to provide for a like appropriation to be distributed equitably.

Bills passed to prohibit the preparation of drugs and prescriptions by any persons except licensed pharmacists in towns of over 600 people. The bill to abolish bucket shops was made special order for next Thursday. Directors of the Jamestown exposition were invited to address the Legislature Thursday.

Bills passed to relieve the agricultural department from paying \$10,000 annually or current expenses of the Agricultural & Mechanical College. Resolution was adopted requesting N. C. Representative in Congress to support the Hepburn-Doolittle bill for a national anti jug law. Bill passed to repeal the charter of Myrtle, Brunswick county, a distillery owned of 48 people; to prevent drunkenness in Chatham county. A bill was introduced providing that indigent prisoners confined in jail waiting trials to be heard may be worked to pay their bills.
