## RALEIGH

### WILL FIGHT THE BILL.

The Law to Abolish Compulsory Pilotage Sure to be Given a Hard

Road To Travel. Insurance

Commissioner Collects

\$23,000. Important

Additions to the

Hall of His-

tory.

Raleigh, Jan. 31.--In the Legislature this week the bill to abolish compulsory pilotage on the Cape Fear river will be introduced, and will be sure to provoke a great fight. Compulsory pilotage was established there in 1784. The bill proposes to abolish it on all coastwise vessels and on all foreign vessels under three hundred tons, so that there will be only compulsory pilotage on the Bar for vessels of over 300 tons, everything else being done away with.

Before Judge Purnell today there was a motion by James H. Poy, of counsel for the State, to relax the costs in the Atlantic & North Carolina railway receivership suit. The costs aggregate about \$900.

It is said that Senator A. H. Eller of Winston-Salem is to be after the first of next July the Secretary-treasurer of the North Carolina railway succeeding Dan Hugh McLean, the president incumbent. It is further said that the rule will be changed so that this official will not be required to reside at Burlington.

It is learned that there is absolutely no intention on the part of the legislature to enlarge the present capitol, all the ideas favoring the erection of a new building. The House and Senate committees on public buildings and grounds visited the Supreme court, State Library, Museum and store ware houses, two of which are rented at a cost of \$800 a year and saw the enormous quantities of books and records stored in these places, with much danger from fire, and also in the warehouse with risk of leaky roofs. The committees have not as yet decided on the kind of a building they will recommend in one building, on the fourth floor there was found to be forty tons of books. To make up a set of reports, for example, now requires trips to four different buildings.

Insurance Commissioner Young, during the present month collected over \$23,000 which goes into the treasury. Inquiry was made of Insurance Commissioner Young as to the fire losses in this State during the past year. He said that the losses were less than usual and that thanks to the excellent laws the record keeps on improving. In almost every other State there is an increase of losses. The general inquiry and application to enter this State show that the companies know very well the improved conditions here. The general public has no idea how much the companies like good legislation, like that in force here, yet North Carolina collects above the average in license fees from them.

Commissioner of Agriculture, Patterson has returned from the New Orleans Cotton Growers Convention and was interviewed regarding it. He said it did good work along practical lines, and that he never saw a more enthusiastic body. There is practical unanimity in the purpose to curtail acreage and hold the crop, and the best thinkers expressed the confident belief that the plans perfected can be fully carried out. Mr. Patterson says the delegates were representative men of the South and that their enthusiasm and determination show the wide spread feeling in the entire cotton belt and "that hence he thinks the plan will be carried to a successful conclusion. North Carolina had 25 delegates present, Henry C. Dockery having been made chairman of the delegation. He says there is great determination on the part of the cotton growers in North Carolina to hold out.

There has been placed in the Hall of History a sword worn by Capt. James Moore of the North Carolina troops in the war of 1812 and also a canteen shot from the battlefields of Moore's Creek, both of these lent by representative James F. Moore of the legislature.

### THE DAY IN LEGISLATURE

Some Important Bills Introduced In

Both Houses of The Assembly.

In the Senate the following bills were introduced today: Requiring fire proof vaults for county records. To amend the banking laws. Defining what shall constitute evidence of premeditation in murder trials. Bills allowing Chatham and Alamance counties to issue bonds passed. After long argument the bill as reported by the committee regulating fishing in Pamlico and Albemarle sounds was passed. House bill extending the corporate limits of Monroe reported adversely by the Senate committee provoked another long discussion resulting in its passage twenty-nine to eight. Only local bills were introduced in the house, chief among these being one paying the chairman of county commissioners of Northampton one hundred dollars per annum and members of the board four dollars per day, another placing officers of Guilford county on salary of two thousand dollars, all fees to go to the road fund. There were 3 hours discussion on a bill to allow new trials in criminal cases for newly discovered evidence pending appeal to the supreme court. The bill passed on second reading forty-eight to forty-seven but went over under rule until tomorrow for final reading.

RIOTERS GETTING DESPERATE. Warsaw, Jan. 30.--The bread riots have begun in earnest led by women, hungry at the point of starvation. They are determined and desperate. The city is under martial law. The schools are closed, business is paralyzed and strikers are going through the streets looting shops and destroying property. Food is so scarce that there is suffering even among the rich. In some parts of the city it is impossible to procure food.
