ENDORSED JAMESTOWN EXPOSITION.

Raleigh, Feb. 1.—In the House bills introduced, to allow convicts to work public roads in Greene; to incorporate Citizens Bank of Edenton; to regulate the sale of patent medicines containing alcohol or dangerous drugs; to provide for interchangeable mileage books on railways.

Bills passed regulating the sale of cotton seed meal and fixing standard; to provide for primary election in Craven.
Resolutions were adopted endorsing the Jamestown Exposition and requesting North Carolina senators and representatives to favor national appropriations for it and inviting General R. F. Hoke of Confederate army to accept a public reception by the General Assembly.

Bill to prohibit use of Dutch nets in Albemarle and Pamlico sounds and their tributaries was tabled 38 to 34.

CZAR'S LIFE ATTEMPTED.

Vienna, Feb. 1.—Three assassins have been arrested at the Czar's palace at Czarokoe Solo according to a dispatch printed at Craow. Parties favoring new reforms were discovered within the walls of the palace and guards suspecting they were there to attempt to assassinate the emperor immediately put them under arrest and searched them, when revolutionary documents were found in their pockets. They were cast into separate cells today and will undergo a rigid examination.

DEATH OF ROBERT C. KEHO.

An Estimable Citizen Passes Away Suddenly.
The many friends of Mr. Robert C. Kehoe were pained and shocked yesterday morning to learn of his demise at the home of his son No 18 Broad St. Mr. Kehoe had been in poor health for some time but had been able to be around the house and on the street considerably. When he retired Tuesday night he was apparently in as good health as he had been for several months. Yesterday morning he did not arise and when inquiry was made he was found in a dying condition. He did not rally in response to the efforts to revive him, but passed quietly away. His disease was heart failure.

Robert C. Kehoe was born in County Mayo, Ireland January 1, 1832. He came to America when very young. He joined the Northern Army being a member of the 71st New York Regiment and in 1862 was transferred to the Quartermaster department with headquarters at New Bern. He has been a resident here ever since except when he lived on a farm known as the Egypt plantation for a few years.

He was married to Miss Emeline Whitford, who preceded him to the grave some five years ago, July 27th, 1888. To them were born three sons and two daughters.

Mr. Kehoe was a highly respected gentleman and had held offices of trust and honor. He had a wide circle of friends with whom he was popular, and by whom his loss will be deplored.

The funeral services will be held at St. Paul's Catholic Church at 2:30 this afternoon. Rev. Father George will officiate.

FARMERS WILL INSIST

UPON TEN CENTS AS THE MINIMUM PRICE FOR COTTON.

A Handsome Memorial. January a Continued Freeze. Gov. Glenn And Staff Go to Pinehurst. Worlds Fair Exhibits From This State Will Arrive Next Week.

Raleigh, N. C., Feb. 1.—Henry C. Dockery, U. S. Marshal, who was chairman of the North Carolina delegation at the New Orleans Cotton Growers Convention, was asked about the holding out by the North Carolina growers for reasonable prices and said: "The farmers here are determined to hold for 10 cents. In four months the mill men will be clamoring for cotton unless prices rise. Their supply is beginning to run short at a number of mills. I do not believe you could buy 100 bales of cotton in North Carolina for 8c. In fact none is on the market.

Past Grand Master Mason John Nichols has been the means of returning a very handsome Masonic watch charm to Past Grand Master Williams of Charlotte. It was made in 1860 and over 20 years ago was found in the lobby of the hotel in New York. Mr. Williams was Grand Master in 1859-60 and the only living ante-bellum Grand Master.

James H. Hines of Rocky Mount and Henry P. Clark of Elizabethtown have been commissioned United States deputy marshals.

The weather during January here was what may be termed an almost continual freeze and the plumbers have reaped the harvest. Perhaps no other place in the state is there more bad plumbing than here and in not a few cases people have been unable to get water for sometimes as much as a week at a time, at a time when they really need it the most. There is no inspector of plumbing, strange to say and no supervision at all. A great deal of the plumbing is done on a summer basis.

A number of commissions were issued today to officers of the National Guard among these to Matt Manley, re-appointed assistant inspector general; J. F. Cannon, Asst. Adjt. General; R. W. Holladay, Asst. Paymaster General; F. N. Dunston, Assistant chief of engineers; Charles H. White, Asst. Inspector General of small arms practice; L. B. Bristol, Asst. Inspector small arms practice. Also the following composing the brigade staff of the first brigade: Gen. Joseph F. Armfield commanding; most being re-appointments but there being a few new ones. R. L. Leinster, Adjt. Gen.; White D. Smith, Inspector General; R. P. Hackney, Commissary; J. G. Hollingsworth, Quartermaster; R. T. Daniel, Paymaster; V. C. Bullard, Judge Advocate; D. R. Johnson, ordinance officer; George L. Lyon and Barton Pierce, Aides.

A charter is granted the People's Bank at Kinston, capital stock \$50,000. It is for the colored race. The negroes have a bank at New Bern also. The state authorizes the Pomona Terra Co. a Company of Guilford county to double its capital stock by making it \$60,000. Today the funeral of Mrs. B. Sidney Jerman was held here from Edenton Street Methodist Church. She was greatly beloved in Raleigh and indeed wherever known.

Very great interest is expressed by not only the Confederate Veterans but by the general public regarding the placing of the memorial at Appomattox, and it is evident that a great many people from this state will be there April 9th, when it will be unveiled. It is expected that the National Guard of the state will be well represented.

Governor Glenn and his staff will go to Pinehurst in April as the guests of Mr. Leonard Tuttle. For several years Mr. Tuttle has entertained the governors and members of the staff, in an extremely handsome manner. The students of the State School for the blind gave a physical culture exhibition last evening to the legislature and to the general public, about 700 people being present. The attendance at the school is larger than ever before. It is perhaps the only state institution which has been built with a view to the future, none of the others being large enough.

Next week the exhibits which this state had at the St. Louis exposition are expected to begin to arrive here. There will be a large gain, so far as the museum is concerned, because of the fact that many very successful last year, especially for the exposition, and so will be added to the ones which had previously been on view here.

The following bill prepared by W. J. Pugh for the North Carolina History Club of which J. Bryan Geisler is chairman was introduced by Gov. Glenn: that for two years, 1905 and 1906, \$2000 per month of the public school fund be appropriated to be used by the State Board of Education as far as it may deem it desirable to encourage and promote the production and to preserve the control and publication of such school history as in the judgment of the board properly relate to the history and institutions of

the government of North Carolina. That the Board of Education shall fix the prices at which the books published under the authority of this act shall be sold to the children in public schools and the proceeds of such sales not further needed in the judgment of the board in the purposes of this act shall belong to and be a part of the public school funds. The books published by authority of this act shall be used in all the public schools under such rules and regulations as the said board shall prescribe.

The Supreme court meets next Monday to examine applicants for license to practice law, and next Tuesday the appeals from the First District will be called in the following order: Lewark vs Railroad; Bray vs Williams; Bruster vs Elizabeth City; Richardson vs Oil Company; Ward vs Day; School districts vs city of Asheville (this case having been specially set for the end of this term.

LOWER RATES ON RAILWAYS.

Bill Introduced to Make Rates Lower.

Raleigh, Feb. 1.—In the Senate no bills of general importance were introduced except one reducing fares on railways to 24 cents and one better regulating fire insurance and other companies. Bills passed to better protect clams and shell fish in Brunswick and New Hanover counties.

The principal discussion was on the Ward bill, which amends Watts liquor regulation law. It provided that no town of less than 1,500 population should authorize to grant license for manufacture or sale of liquor. An amendment was accepted by Watts to modify this, making population 1000.

A further amendment offered providing every town authorizing sale or manufacturing shall keep salaried police officers who shall make daily inspections and monthly reports, and possession of U. S. license to sell where sale is prohibited shall be prima facie evidence of violation of law. Ward said these amendments did not change his bill in any way particular.

Motion to postpone until Thursday adopted. Bills passed final reading. To enable married men whose wives are insane or lunatics to convey their land free of dower upon certificate of Supt. of hospital for insane; to correct defective orders in registration of deeds.
