HOT TALKS

ON WARD'S LIQUOR BILL IN SENATE.

Claim of Jeopardizing Democratic Interests in State. Unceasing Introduction of New Bills Only of Small Value.

Raleigh, N. C., Feb. 10.—In the Senate bills were introduced to provide a State Purchasing agent for various educational and charitable institutions. Bills passed to amend the charter of Edenton; to better protect the owners of hogs in Tyrrell; to elect by vote of the people magistrates and county commissioners in Washington; to amend the law regarding railway passes for newspapers; to incorporate the Dover Southbound railway.

The Senate took up as a special order the Ward liquor regulation bill which is the amendment to the Watts law. Fleming introduced a substitute which was read and he made a bitter attack on the bill, to which Ward replied, particularly addressing to Fleming's declaration, that the Ward bill would jeopardize the Democratic party. Speeches in favor of the Ward bill were made by McLean, of Scotland, Wright, of Rowan and Scales, Mason and Webb, the latter saying he had been opposed to the bill, but since hearing the argument favored it. Williams and Stubbs spoke against the bill.

The debate was the warmest of the session thus far. Other speeches were made by Vann, Long, Gilliam, Crisp, Sinclair. Vann offered an amendment providing that the law shall become effective January 1st, next. This was adopted. Ward's bill then passed second reading, 25 to 16, but Gilliam objected to a third reading and Scales motion to suspend the rules, failed.

In the House bills were introduced to allow Beaufort to issue bonds to build a hotel; to regulate pay of jurors in Chowan; to allow railways to forbid trespassing on tracks, as in the case of land-lords; to allow Hyde county to levy a special tax; to protect wood and timber land from fires. The House took up the special order, the divorce bill. McNinch offered a substitute prepared by the minority of the judiciary committee. Alley offered a substitute for all bills. It was ordered that all bills be printed and made special order Tuesday. Bills passed to prevent false representations in sale of merchandise; to allow the American Warehouse Company to increase its capital stock to five million dollars; to amend the charter of Howland Improvement Company.

CONFEDERATE VETERAN DEAD.

Ammonia Standard Raised. Game Warden Noted. Big Distillery Lobby.

Raleigh, Feb. 10.—Today W. W. Gordon, of Washington, who served in Company K, 10th Regiment, N. C. troops, (artillery) died at the Soldiers Home here. His age was 86 and he had been in the home 4 years. He was buried in the section of the Confederate cemetery in which inmates of the home are interred, and where there are now more than 100 such graves.

The Senate Committee on Agriculture has made 8 per cent as the standard of the amount of ammonia in cotton seed meal, raising the standard one half of one per cent, 7 1/2 having been the figure first proposed.

The seat of Representative Phipps of Watauga who died yesterday is draped in mourning as is also his desk, while a bouquet of white carnations stands upon the latter. A photograph was taken of the seat and desk, with the other Republican members of the legislature in their seats nearby.

Secretary Gilbert Pearson of the State Audubon Society notified the 30 game wardens in the State to provide food for the partridges, and he hopes that people generally will feed the birds. The weather this week has been very trying on them, owing to the heavy sleets and the snow, and the birds are said to be very thin indeed.

There is a great deal more business before the committees than there is before the legislature, and they attract a great deal more attention, the legislative proceedings having been up to date excessively dull. The proportion of small bills continues to be very large.

The big lobby which is trying to "save the face" of the distillery towns of Advance, Shore and Williams is here and hard at work, after most of its members had a rest of a day or two. A great deal of feeling has been aroused by these cases and by the announcement that some members of the legislature were determined to save the town of Williams at all hazard.

Mass Meeting Last Night.

In view of the bill now before the legislature providing for the sale of the electric light and water works plant, a mass meeting was held at the Court House last night under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce. The meeting was attended by about one hundred men and the discussion pro and con was quite spirited. J. J. Wolfenden presided and George Green was secretary.

The leading speakers were Messrs C. T. Watson, W. W. Clark, S. M. Brinson, M. DeW. Stevenson, C. E. Fry and Dr. Leinster Duffy.

The sentiment of the meeting was quite divided but several strong speeches were made favoring sale. Mr. W. W. Clark submitted a substitute for the present bill stating that the one before the legislature is of too great latitude. The substance of the bill was that the mayor and board of aldermen are authorized to sell the electric light and water works to party or parties upon the endorsement of the people expressed in popular election. The sale of the property is to be preceded by an advertisement for bidders for 30 days in the New Bern JOURNAL or any other paper that the Board may see fit to publish in. After the bids have been made the name of the parties making the most favorable offer are to be published for 30.

The money realized from the sale of the plant shall be applied to the bonded indebtedness and any person or persons diverting the money or part of the money shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor and shall be arrested for that offense. The terms of sale shall be explicitly stated and the rates must not be raised from their present schedule.

The meeting adjourned without taking any definite action and another meeting will be held next week.

COSTLY WINTER WEATHER

Oldest State Printer Dead. Railroad Receivers Slow. Major Stedman.

Raleigh, Feb. 10.—William M. Brown who is said to have been the oldest printer in the State died at his home here today, of paralysis and grippe, at the age of 80 years. He has been married fifty years. His wife and several children surviving him. Before the Civil war he published the Spirit of the Age paper here and in 1877 established the Evening Visitor. He had worked at his trade until about two years ago, when he was paralyzed. For several terms between 1870 and 1880 he was treasurer of this county. He was a devoted member of Edenton Street Methodist Episcopal church, and was an earnest and zealous Christian.

Judge Purnell has made an order in the Federal courts requiring W. J. Edwards and V. E. McBee, the receivers of the Carolina and Northern Railway to make reports at once and if these are not made in ten days they will have to show cause why they should not be removed. Judge Purnell says they have not made the quarterly reports required and that McBee has made no reports of any kind since his appointment as co-receiver.

He expressed his pleasure at this. He looks extremely well and said with a smile that he was not here on any lobby matters, but was enjoying himself thoroughly. Other arrivals today were: W. D. MC'CUE CONFESSES

Killing His Wife. Was Hung Yesterday.

Charlottesville, Va., Feb. 10.—This morning J. Edward McCue expiated the sentence for the murder of his wife. It was nine minutes before life was extinct.

Immediately after the execution McCue's three spiritual advisers gave out the following statement: "J. Samuel McCue stated this morning in our presence and requested us to make it public he did not wish to leave this world with any suspicion resting on any person other than himself, that he alone was responsible and the deed was impelled by an evil power beyond his control, and that he recognized his sentence as just."
