A MATTER OF HEALTH



EVERY EVENING CILLS

Keep Legislature's Attention. Judges Salaries Bill Set at \$3,000 With \$250 For Expenses.

Special to Journal. Raleigh, Feb. 15.—Bills were introduced in the Senate to permit dispensary towns in Johnson county to vote for prohibition; to erect a monument to Wiley P. Mangum; to prevent insurance contracts in North Carolina; to incorporate the Winston High Point and Inter Urban railway.

Bills passed to incorporate the South port and North Western railway; to amend the general election law so county commissioners may pay such extra compensation as may be just and fair; to prevent hunting on lands of another without permission in Currituck; to repay ex-estate treasurer, William H. Worth \$2,600 State funds lost by the failure of the bank at Asheville, First National Bank of Asheville, the bank of Guilford; to allow counties to provide a room or hall for Confederate veteran meetings; to protect landlords and tenants, with an amendment striking out some drastic features.

In the House bills were introduced to allow Hertford county to levy special tax; to allow Wilmington to improve streets, construct parks, establish a public library and lease docks and wharves; to provide fire protection for all public buildings, to appropriate \$50,000 for a State exhibit at the Jamestown exposition; to provide for a high school in Hertford; to pay all ex-confederates over 70 years of age.

The bill to abolish compulsory pilotage on the Cape Fear river came up with a favorable report and also a minority report, and was made special order for Friday. The special order of the day was the bill to increase salaries of all judges to \$3,500. Many amendments were offered and many speeches made. Graham's substitute making the salary \$3,000 was adopted, 63 to 40 and the bill passed its readings. It allows \$250 for expenses.

Civil Service Examinations.

A competitive examination under the rules of the U. S. Civil Service Commission, for the position of clerk-carrier in the post office at New Bern, N. C., will be held on the 25th day of February 1905, commencing at 9 o'clock a. m.

Applications for this examination must be made on the prescribed form, which, with necessary instructions, may be obtained from the commission's local representative at the New Bern, N. C. post-office or from the undersigned. Applications will not be accepted unless received by the undersigned before 4.30 o'clock p. m., on Feb. 23, 1905. All persons wishing to take this examination should secure blanks and fill them out at once in order to allow time for any necessary corrections.

SOMEBODY'S JOB.

Guesses On Who May Be Commissioner Immigration.

Conditional Pardons Bill. To Extend Charter A. & N. C. First Night Session. Sale of Property By Federal Court.

Raleigh, N. C., Feb. 15.—One of the interesting questions asked is who is to be Commissioner of Immigration. The bill has passed the Senate but not the House. For several weeks there have been applications for the place and at one time it seemed that Governor Glenn was about to be over run by them, but now it is found that the Council of State and not the Governor will make the appointments and so they are giving him a rest, very much to his delight. Col. John S. Cunningham is very prominently mentioned among the aspirants for this position. You may be sure there are others.

The Governor has been invited by the North Carolina Society of New York City to be its guest at a banquet to be given on the 27th inst. at the hotel Rhea. He and Governor Haywood of South Carolina will be the guests of honor. The invitations say that the dinner will be the finest ever given and in the finest hotel in the world. The governor is in correspondence with Governor Haywood and is arranging to go.

Governor Glenn is very much interested in the bill to grant conditional pardons. He said today that he was very deeply concerned in this measure, which has passed the Senate but is hung up in the House. It will enable him to temper justice with mercy. Conditional pardons have been granted but the law needs to be strengthened. One such was granted last summer by Governor Aycock and the recipient of the pardon having failed to comply with his agreement is to be sent back to the public roads to complete his sentence.

A charter is granted to the Thomasville Chair Company, capital stock \$100,000, D. A. Allen being the principal stockholder. State Auditor Dixon requests that the announcement be made that the last legislature enacted a law allowing all disabled ex-Confederate soldiers to peddle without license upon certificates signed by the county pension board. Senator Beasley of Currituck county has gone to his home at Poplar Branch, upon receipt of news that his nine year old son is missing and that there is fear that the child has been kidnapped. He went to school yesterday morning and was seen part of the way towards the school house, but then disappeared.

A bill has been introduced in the legislature to extend the time of the duration of the charter of the Atlantic and North Carolina railway. The charter now expires before the end of the term of the lease of the road to the Howland Improvement Company. Fire pretty well gutted the store of Bailey Upchurch in the heart of the city at 2 o'clock this morning. He says the fire was caused by rats and matches or by a cigarette. The loss is covered by insurance.

It was predicted some time ago that no new counties would be formed by the legislature, and this proves to be an accurate prediction. The sentiment is all against any more counties. The first night session of the legislature held last night was very largely attended. A great many ladies were in the gallery to hear the debate on the divorce bill, though some of the language must not have been very agreeable.

Judge Funnell of the Federal court has ordered the sale of the steamer City of Fayetteville and other property in the suit of Jacobs against the Wilmington Steamboat Co. which is in receiver's hands. A report has at last been received from the receivers of the Carolina Northern Railroad Company, the receivers being McFee and Edwards, who appear to have given Judge Funnell quite a lot of trouble lately.

Superior Court Proceedings.

The only case tried in the Superior Court yesterday were those of Spruill vs. Spruill and L. G. Daniels vs. Williams. The former was divorce, judgment for plaintiff. The latter was an action for recovery of property; verdict for plaintiff.
