WARD BILL PASSES.

After Hot Fight And Denunciation From Democrats.

Amendments Voted Down By Party Vote.
Content in Tonnage Tax. Bills Passed in Fast Time. All in Name of Democracy

Raleigh, N. C. Feb. 28.—In Senate bills and resolutions introduced urging Congress to promote the project of an inland water way in North Carolina. To renovate Senate chamber and House of representatives. Bills to regulate employment of telegraphers and railway telegraph operators. Bills passed to provide system of repairing bridges in Pamlico; for working of public roads in Chowan; to allow Pasquotank to issue bonds and levy special tax; to give Jones county road law; to allow Winton to levy special tax; to prescribe time for holding election for dispensary at Ayden and to allow people of Creswell to vote on Dispensary; to increase number of commissioners of Beaufort county; to reduce limits of Fountain, Pitt county; to authorize county board of pensions to place on pension roll any meritorious case, even where the person may have property worth \$500.

Senate took up as special order bill to relieve board of Agriculture from contributing \$10,000 annually to current expenses of Agricultural and Mechanical college at Raleigh.

Scales offered amendments first reducing tonnage tax on fertilizers to 15 cents, this being defeated an amendment to make it 15 cents per ton, this also was defeated. The bill passed its final reading. Bill to erect Hall of Records was made special order Wednesday.

The Ward liquor regulation bill which passed Senate prohibiting distilleries in towns of less than thousand population, came up as special order in House. McNinch warned all friends of bill against voting for any amendment or for motion to table any amendment as such course might kill bill. Turner offered substitute making it unlawful to sell or manufacture liquor in North Carolina subject to vote of people of each county at general election next year. He said he offered this in good faith. He attacked the Ward bill, saying his bill would establish prohibition in every county where people voted for it. McNinch asked if Watts law did not give that right. Turner replied, Watts law only permitted towns people to vote, and said his bill did not allow sale or manufacture of liquor country districts. It did not supplant Watts act, but amended it. Murphy of Rowan offered amendment prohibiting sale as well as manufacture of liquor in towns of less than 1000. He said he opposed Ward bill because he was a Democrat. Feinster said Murphy had fought the Watts bill and was actually against his own amendment which was offered to defeat Ward bill. Mitchell of Bertie spoke of powerful lobby the distillers had here and the literature they were circulating, and said the other side had not such lobby. He said those who had rallied around the flag of Williams and Shore had tried to decapitate Chairman Simmons, the head of the Democratic party, in recent month at his efforts to protect home church and school. Graham of Granville attacked Ward bill, declaring it contained nothing of temperance or morality, but that while it meant no good to the temperance cause, it meant great evil to Democratic party. He declared he saw his temperance in the Ward bill then special privileges for Whiskey Trust, at expense of home manufacturers. He did not believe the temperance forces were behind, nor the bill intended for this effect. But it was certainly possible somebody by the intention of the Whiskey Trust might be supporting the movement. He declared Watts bill should be called one to increase blockade distilleries in North Carolina, and that there were three blockade distilleries remaining today, where there was one when Watts law went into effect. Turner's substitute was lost, 37 to 21, the amendment being defeated with great applause, the vote recorded a net vote of 43 in favor of the bill.

Legislature From Country View.

Judging from the criticism made on the work of the legislature, by people from the country districts it is likely that trouble is ahead for somebody. A man prominent in his neighborhood, and a successful farmer, upon hearing that the legislature intended to adjourn next week, delivered himself thus:

"The present session General Assembly of North Carolina has been the worst failure I have ever known. Not a single bill of public interest do I know of has been passed. All the work done has been in the way of class legislation, making neighborhood laws, and wrangling about the liquor question and no bill that I have seen had much in it to promote temperance, but some of them, if passed, will fatten the whiskey trust, and by the way, it would be interesting to know how much that trust is responsible for this prohibition movement. Dispensaries, we know are its favorite off spring."

"Well, there were many other bills introduced and passed that will be of no benefit to anyone, unless the profusion and confusion of laws encourage litigation. The way the legislature has dabbled in matters affecting the selling of peanuts at night, the adjustment of one's bee hives, the forbidding the killing of game in certain counties, where the particular species to be protected have been extinct for many years, to prevent the killing of birds in one county while the people in the one adjoining can slay all they want to. The poor birds have no knowledge of the dividing line are of course liable to fly to their death, while kindfriends are trying to protect them, I say all this would be amusing if it was not so serious. The more laws are made the more laws there are to be broken, and so many laws creates espionage, and that creates crime of various kinds. Well it will all soon be over and it is quite likely that some of the politicians will have many explanations to make."

There will be another conference tomorrow morning, and then the legislative committee will make its report as to the course to be taken.

\$550,000 IS INCREASE

Raleigh, Feb. 28.—Members of the appropriations committee say tonight, the bill they will report covering all appropriations, will carry about \$550,000 more than the appropriation made two years ago. The committee will give the Hospital for the Insane at Raleigh all it asked for except fifty thousand dollars for the purchase of a farm. Will give the Hospital at Morganton all asked for, amusement hall and spur railway. The bill carrying all appropriations is to be reported to the House tomorrow evening. Most of the increase is for charitable institutions.

HALF HOLIDAY REWARD

To Pupils at Graded School for Punctuality.

There was joy in a number of the rooms of the Graded School, yesterday it being the last day of the month, when those rooms whose pupils had a perfect record for punctuality during the past month received the half holiday reward.

The following grades were those whose records were perfect: 4 A, 5 A, 5 B, 6 A, 6 B, 7, 8, 9, 10, nine grades in all.

The success of Prof. Craven's efforts in enforcing punctuality in his school is bearing splendid results. It was a hard task to begin with, plenty of protests, but thanks to the great support given to his efforts by his teachers, the victory may be said to be won, and tardiness is a badge not wanted by any pupil in the school.

February has been a severe month in its weather conditions. but there has been an attendance of about 500, against 459 for the same month in 1904, but the punctuality of pupils is shown the splendid results, there being in February 1904, 370 tardy pupils, while in the past month the number was 19.

Mr. T. A. Green, President of Board of Trustees New Bern Academy, was a visitor yesterday in the grades which were to have the half holiday, and spoke of the good results which punctuality assured to everyone in all walks of life, and congratulated the pupils for their faithful attendance during February and hoped to see the good efforts for punctuality increase throughout the entire school so that every grade would have it half holiday on March 31st.
