PINE LUMBER CO SAW MILL BURNS

A Serious Loss To Messrs. Hawk & Aberty. A Fire That Was Hard To Fight.

About 5:45 last night fire broke out in or near the engine room of the Pine Lumber Company's plant and destroyed the saw mill. The saw dust, broken bits of board, slabs etc., was quick fuel for the flames and it spread with terrific rapidity and even with the very good fire protection at the plant it gained headway at an amazing rate.

The Buttons and Atlantics were on the scene quickly and pipes from all the available hydrants were playing on the fire but seemingly having but little effect on the flames.

Much credit is due to the firemen for their efficient work in the face of great difficulties.

It was impossible to learn the extent of the loss but while the saw mill and machinery was destroyed the dry kiln was saved. But little lumber was burned.

There was no insurance on the plant.
