RALEIGH

Elks Temple Soon To Be Erected In That City.

Governor Starts Pardon Bill. Promises To Advise Publicly His Delays. Deaths Legislative Outlets Discussed.

Raleigh, March 21.—Raleigh Lodge of Elks, at an enthusiastic meeting last night elected J. F. Morrill representative to the Grand Lodge at Buffalo next July and announced that work will begin within the next few days on their splendid new temple, it being their purpose to celebrate their fourth anniversary in it in November.

Governor Glenn pardons Rubie Warren at the urgent request of the judge who in Watauga county sentenced him to five years for killing his own father. The judge wrote the governor that he is satisfied now that the boy was justified in killing his father, the only regret about it being that it fell to the lot of the son to rid the community of a nuisance. The man was attempting to whip his wife at the time the son shot him.

The Governor says he intends to keep the public fully advised as to any and all action of his relative to the pardon bill. To that end he announces that he has declined to grant pardons for Alfred Pritchard from Mitchell county serving ten years for burglary and W. B. Patterson serving two years from Haywood county for seduction. His excellency, says it develops that the man Patterson left his wife and ran away with another, for the seduction of whom he was convicted and that he evidently deserved all if not more sentence than he received.

It is learned that application is to be made for pardon for Ed Utley serving twenty years for killing Clerk Hollingsworth of LaFayette hotel, Fayetteville. He is serving a twenty year sentence. The governor has not been advised yet on what grounds the pardon will be asked.

Mr. T. B. Eldredge, telegraph editor of the Post, left last evening for Richmond to attend the funeral of his mother, who died in Chase City yesterday morning. She suffered a stroke of paralysis a few days ago.

Mr. C. A. Johnson received a telegram last night from Mrs. Johnson that her mother died in Morganton last afternoon. Mrs. Johnson had been at her bedside for several days. Pneumonia was the cause of the death.

It is discovered that the inadvertent omission of "not" from a clause in the act by the recent legislature prescribing prohibition for Spring Hope, Nash county fixes it so that druggists cannot fill prescriptions for physicians under their immediate treatment, making that place the most strictly prohibition town on the map.

SHOOFLY NEARLY WRECKED.

Narrow Escape From a Serious Accident Near Kinston.

The west-bound "shoofly" on the A. & N. C. Railroad last night came near being wrecked at the east end of the main switch, near the freight depot, and the engine trucks and drive wheels did leave the track and run on the cross-ties for two car lengths. The train was coming in to the station very slowly when the accident might have been a terrible catastrophe with great loss of life, as there were many passengers on the train for Kinston and other points.

Why the engine wheels left the track is not definitely known, but Engineer Marshall and the fireman are of the opinion that the switch was about half open, the colored fireman asserting that the iron head at the switch was straight up, corroborating this theory. The tender trucks and car trucks, however, did not leave the track and remained on the main line. This throws still more mystery on the engine wheels going off.

The noise made by the engine bumping on the cross-ties attracted the attention of the waiting passengers at the station, and quite a number soon gathered at the deserted train. The work train engine which happened to be here assisted the "shoofly" engine in getting back on the track after about an hour and she resumed her trip, with the worst for the accident.

No one was hurt and the damage was very slight.

Negro Murderer Caught

Last night Chief Hargett received a telephone message from Smithfield that the negro who murdered the colored woman, Martha Cope, at a negro school here a few years ago had been arrested there and would be held subject to his trial.

Officer A. L. Bryan will be sent to identify the man and if he is the right man will bring him back.

The circumstances will be recounted by the people and there is no doubt a feeling of rejoicing over the capture of the murderer who had been at large for so long a time.

FIRE ALARM FIENDS ARRESTED.

Three Boys in Prison Under the Above Charge.

Dave Bell, Aaron Bell and Leo Cogden were arrested last evening by officer Montague on the charge of tampering with fire boxes and sending in false alarms. If the charge is proven a question that has puzzled the police and fire men for months will be solved for a time at least. It is well known how the department has been bothered by the repeated sounding of false alarms. Perhaps some punishment by the way of example will do some good.

The boy Aaron Bell led the officer quite a chase before he was captured. Having held him in suspicion for some time the officer got sight of him on Craven street near the post office and when Bell saw the officer he snuffed danger and made a lively sprint down Pollock street. Being small he was winded in a short distance and was caught on George street.

The boys—Cogden and Bell though young seem to be venturing on all kinds of deviltry. They have been arrested for stealing many times and severely whipped by officers of the law twice. They come as near the description of being incorrigible as any boy could. Nobody feels safe when they are around for fear they will steal. When they were put in the cells they immediately got good and began to pray as loud as their small lungs could holler. Their case will be dealt with severely this time as the offense is made a crime against the State for which the penitentiary is the penalty. They will be tried today.

UP-TO-DATE SANITARIUM.

New Bern Soon to Be Supplied by a Most Necessary Want.

The Journal takes great pleasure to announce that a city hospital—a thing that has been repeatedly advocated through these columns, is soon to be established in this city, or at least the nucleus for such will soon be launched. Shipping Notes.

For several weeks shipping business has been unusually dull, owing to the streams and bays in the north being frozen. Only for the last few days has the ice begun breaking up to any extent. One captain of a lumber craft which arrived here Tuesday stated that the ice was eight inches thick in Delaware bay last week. And that there had been forty-two snows there this winter. All the mills here are overstocked with lumber which could not be shipped away on account of the frozen given, but it is expected that there will be a brisk movement of lumber now.

The schooner Grace G. Bennett, Capt. E. Eggers arrived Tuesday with a cargo of fish scrap for Meadows guano factory and will load with lumber.

The tug Columbia came in with five barges in tow, Atlas, Comet, Orion, J. B. Blades, and Joseph P. Tucker, all of which lumber, three at Mungers mill, two at Blades. The Tucker was loaded with phosphate for E. K. Bishop the Atlas coal, others light.

Arrested for Cruelty.

Capt. A. W. Golden, of the schooner Mystery is under a \$50 justified bond for appearance before United States Commissioner Hill next Monday on the charges of cruelty preferred by his crew. The specific law violated is section 5347, which defines beating, wounding and withholding proper food and nourishment. The complaint alleges all three violations.

A warrant for Golden's arrest was issued some time ago but the officer failed to find him. Hearing of the action made against him he went to Commissioner Hill's office Monday and voluntarily surrendered. He was put under bond in order to summon the complaining witnesses.

J. E. & R. O'Hara are the attorneys for the prosecution.
